MANAGER'S COMMENTS

For the 23rd consecutive year, the Henrico County Department of Finance's Office of Management and Budget has prepared the *Financial Trends Monitoring System* document prior to the Board's approval of the operating budget. This document provides an historical review, over an 11-year period, of financial and budgetary information that is combined with economic and demographic information. During these difficult economic times, the information provided within the *Trends* document is used alongside the *Comprehensive Annual Financial Report* (CAFR) and the *Annual Fiscal Plan* to monitor the County's financial health. This year's budget process is difficult, but the County is doing well in terms of revenues and expenditures despite these difficult times. The County recently resold bonds within its enterprise fund at a favorable interest rate, which is a reflection of the County's triple AAA/AAA/Aaa bond rating.

Mrs. O'Bannon recited and expressed appreciation for a paragraph on page 9 of the County's *Financial Trend Monitoring System* document for Fiscal Years 1998-2002 that explains how "an over dependence on intergovernmental revenues can have an adverse impact on financial condition." Mr. Kaechele thanked the Department of Finance for putting this document together and spoke to its importance.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS' COMMENTS

Mrs. O'Bannon honored Marion Timberlake Yobs, a resident of the Tuckahoe District who passed away on February 15, 2009. Mrs. Yobs was actively involved in the community and worked very hard to bring women to the fore of the political arena. She taught history and government in Henrico County Public Schools from 1953 to 1965, established the Henrico County Retired School Personnel Association, and was the first woman to run for the Henrico County Board of Supervisors (in 1950) before later running for the Virginia House of Delegates. Mrs. Yobs also served adjoining localities as a guidance counselor and a social worker after retiring from teaching.

Mr. Glover reiterated that the County recently refinanced utility bonds at an interest rate of 3.67 percent, which resulted in a savings of \$5.6 million for the County's enterprise fund. Mr. Kaechele commented that this proves the County's coveted triple-A bond rating is paying off and saving the County money. Mr. Thornton suggested the County impart information on the impact of bond ratings in such a way that is understandable to citizens.

The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a Special Meeting on Monday, March 17, 2008 at 9:30 a.m. in the County Manager's Conference Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Richmond, Virginia. The Chairman called the meeting to order at 9:40 a.m. Those present during the morning session were:

Mr. Kaechele noted that the Board had a busy week ahead. He recognized Mr. Hazelett, who reviewed the schedule for the day.

Expenditure Briefing

Mr. Hazelett narrated a Power Point presentation on the *County Manager's Overview and Expenditure Highlights, Proposed FY 2008-09 Annual Fiscal Plan* (see enclosed copy). He reviewed slides regarding assumptions in developing the FY 2008-09 budget, the County's real

estate tax rate, the most recent Thirteen City/County Comparison of local tax rates, the County's Real Estate Tax Advantage Program (REAP), construction costs and their continued impact, the impact of fixed costs for health care and retirement, and major budget recommendations for both general government and education. During his presentation, Mr. Hazelett responded to a number of questions from members of the Board concerning Virginia Retirement System costs, the level of state funding for proposed teacher salary increases, proposed increases in the County's health care fund, trends in House Bill 599 state funding; sources of state and federal funding for local education; proposed increases in full time equivalent employees (FTEs) for education; turnover and vacancy rates for police positions; inmate medical costs; inspection and repair of Recreation and Parks heating, venting, and air-conditioning (HVAC) systems; public library hours of duties of proposed Senior operation; the Television/Producer position; hospitalization coverage for juveniles in secured detention; and use of the County's sinking fund.

The Board recessed at 10:56 a.m. and reconvened at 11:08 a.m.

Mr. Hazelett announced that Margaret Lewis, a paralegal in the County Attorney's Office, passed away suddenly on the afternoon of March 16.

Mr. Thornton asked for more information on pending legislation impacting health insurance coverage for persons who are incarcerated. There was brief discussion by Board members relating to this issue.

Mr. Hazelett recognized Mr. Walter, who introduced the members of his staff. Mr. Walter pointed to his staff's hard work and dedication in producing a high quality budget document. He invited the Board to ask questions throughout the budget reviews and advised that any questions the staff could not answer immediately would be answered the following day.

Revenue Briefing Mr. Walter narrated a Power Point presentation on the Proposed Annual Fiscal Plan Revenue Briefing, Fiscal Year 2008-09 (see enclosed copy). His presentation included a number of slides relating to the national economy; state budget shortfall, revenues, and funding reductions; the impact of the communication sales and use tax (House Bill 568); changes in the County's real estate tax base; current real property tax revenue; a regional comparison of reassessment increases; a look at local revenues; and a summary of local, state, and federal general fund revenues.

Mr. Walter, Mr. Hazelett, and Mr. Vithoulkas responded to a number of questions from Board members regarding local foreclosure rates; federal funding reductions; economic growth and state revenue trends; the impact of rising gasoline taxes on demand for public transit; the distribution of state lottery proceeds: the status of the County's efforts to change the state funding formula for highway maintenance payments; the share of the County's budget funded by the state; local commercial and residential reassessment trends; the local impact of the Personal Property Tax Relief Act (PPTRA); the revenue impact of previous reductions in the County's machinery and tools tax; annual car sales and registrations in Henrico; and local trends in the Business, Professional, and Occupational License tax (BPOL). Mr. Kaechele commented that the presentation painted an interesting revenue picture and that there may be difficult times ahead.

The Board recessed for lunch at 12:33 p.m. and reconvened at 12:44 p.m.

Mr. Hazelett recognized Mr. Vithoulkas, who provided some comparative information on foreclosure trends in the Richmond metropolitan area versus other areas of the country.

Real Estate Assessments

Mr. Vithoulkas narrated a Power Point presentation on Real Estate Assessments Effective January 1, 2008 (see enclosed copy). He explained slides pertaining to the County's 2008 tax base change, five-year taxable value history, and two-year average residential sales price by district for new construction and existing homes. Mr. Vithoulkas and Mr. Hazelett responded to a number of questions from Board members concerning state regulation of local assessments, residential assessment trends in Henrico and northern Virginia, and the projected amount of new revenues from residential Mr. Thornton cited a need for the and commercial reassessments. County to do a better job of educating citizens on the residential real estate assessment process. He said there is a perception in the community that the County keeps the tax rate low through high assessments and that the assessments are more onerous in certain areas of the County.

The Legislative Budget Reviews with department heads and key officials commenced (see enclosed copy of printed schedule dated 2/28/08, which experienced several changes during the course of the four-day session). The following presentations were made:

• County Manager – Mr. Johnson

Mr. Johnson and Mr. Hazelett responded to questions from Board members pertaining to telecommunications costs, food costs, and technology provided to the Board for business use. Mrs. O'Bannon asked about having personal digital assistants (PDAs) provided to Board members and Mr. Thornton expressed concerns about the County's cellular telephone policy.

• Board of Supervisors – Mr. Johnson

Mr. Johnson explained a new line item relating to the lease of copiers used by the office. He responded to questions from Board members regarding the possible need to update personal computers provided to the Board, the number of positions supporting the Board, dues and association memberships, and a proposed decrease in the office supply line item.

• Public Relations & Media Services - Mrs. McKinney, joined by Mrs. Cooper

Mrs. McKinney advised the Board of plans to make technological upgrades to the Board Room and broadcast Board meetings live over the Internet. She and Mr. Hazelett responded to a number of questions and comments from Board members concerning the logistics of renovating the Board Room for this purpose and relocating Board meetings during the renovation. They also responded to questions pertaining to the location of Comcast's public access studio, HCTV's public service announcements, and the process for surveying citizens on the proposal to change local mailing addresses from Richmond, Virginia to Henrico, Virginia. Mr. Thornton complemented Mrs. McKinney and her staff on the quality of HCTV programs and offered hope that they could become even better. Mr. Kaechele saluted the agency for winning many awards.

• County Attorney - Mr. Rapisarda, joined by Mr. Knight and Mrs. Grizzard

Mr. Rapisarda responded to questions from Board members relating to the professional composition of his staff, the office's telecommunications costs, the definition of "administrative proceedings," and caseload trends.

• Internal Audit – Mr. Martin

Mr. Martin responded to questions from Board members regarding the agency's fraud reporting site, the origin of complaints received by his agency, and long distance telecommunications charges.

The Board recessed at 2:03 p.m. and reconvened at 2:11 p.m.

The Legislative Budget Reviews continued with the following presentations:

• General District Court - Judge Marshall, joined by Mr. Sprader

Judge Marshall commented and responded to questions concerning state legislation addressing salary supplements for General District Court employees. He distributed a spreadsheet listing monthly revenues generated by the General District Court for calendar year 2007 (see enclosed copy), reviewed how the elimination of County decals has affected caseloads, expressed appreciation for recent improvements to General District Court facilities, elaborated on a proposed pre-trial drug testing program, and spoke to the issue of having Driving Under the Influence (DUI) violations charged under the County Code rather than the State Code. Judge Marshall responded to questions from Board members pertaining to current legislative constraints on pre-trial drug testing, revenues generated by the General District Court, the status of state legislation that would provide for breathalyzers in cars in certain cases, and the types of fines for which revenues are returned to the state rather than the County.

• Magistrate – Mr. Conner

Mr. Connor and Mr. Hazelett responded to questions from Mr. Kaechele relating to this agency's request for salary supplements and revenues generated by the agency for the County.

• Circuit Court Services – Judge Hicks, joined by Ms. Bashore

Mr. Kaechele noted that he had enjoyed reading a recent newspaper article profiling Judge Hicks, who then reviewed the Circuit Court's request to the state to add a sixth judge. Judge Hicks and Mr. Hazelett responded to questions from Board members regarding space availability for a sixth judge.

• Drug Court - Judge Hicks, joined by Mr. Cruser and Ms. Shaw

Judge Hicks noted that the Drug Court would be celebrating its fifth anniversary the following month. He and Ms. Shaw responded to a question from Mrs. O'Bannon concerning recidivism rates. Judge Hicks thanked the County for producing a second video on the Drug Court that mostly featured Judge Catherine Hammond. Mr. Kaechele thanked Judge Hicks and the Drug Court staff for doing a great job.

• Juvenile/Domestic Relations Court Services – Judge Williams and Mr. Elliott

Mr. Elliott announced that he would be retiring at the end of July, explained his agency's supplemental request for funds to implement drug testing, reviewed caseload trends for his agency, and referred to the results of a recent staffing study by the Virginia Supreme Court. Judge Williams highlighted several points, including recent increases in alcohol-related cases, and the benefits of on spot urine testing in domestic cases. He responded to questions

from Board members pertaining to caseload trends for traffic cases and whether drug testing also includes alcohol.

• Community Corrections – Mr. Cruser, joined by Ms. MacArthur

Mr. Cruser noted that it was his agency's 25th year of providing services in Henrico. Ms. MacArthur responded to a question from Mrs. O'Bannon relating to the agency's use of criminal justice students as volunteers. Mr. Cruser cited caseload statistics and his agency's space constraints and expressed appreciation for the Board's support. He responded to questions from Board members regarding client restitution.

• Human Resources/Employee Benefits - Mr. Cauble and Mrs. Reid

Mr. Cauble noted that two budgets fall under his agency, one for operations and the other for employee benefits. He referred to the County's attraction and retention efforts and responded to questions from Board members concerning application and interview statistics for County positions. Mrs. Reid highlighted the County's fitness and wellness benefits, updated the Board on a new employee fitness DVD and fitness survey, and expressed appreciation to the Board for its support of the fitness and wellness program. She, Mr. Hazelett, and Mr. Cauble responded to questions from Board members pertaining to the program's focus and participation levels. Mr. Cauble briefly addressed the County's health care premium supplement for retirees. He responded to further questions and comments from Board members relating to the County's annual health care costs and his agency's process for reviewing job applications.

• Circuit Court – Mrs. Smith, joined by Ms. Jamison

Mrs. Smith reviewed State Compensation Board reimbursements received by the County for her agency's operations and explained how her office is complying with a State mandate to provide land records to the public via a secure remote access system. She responded to questions and comments from Board members regarding the legislative history of this mandate, how the system will be protected against identity theft, how Circuit Court electronic records are being handled in Maryland, and the level of state funding that her office will receive to offset the costs of the system.

• Commonwealth's Attorney/ Victim/Witness /Drug Prosecutor - Mr. Kizer and Ms. Shuman-Johnson, joined by Ms. Johnson

Mr. Kizer responded to questions from Mr. Glover pertaining to recent increases in office staffing and explained a supplemental request for additional funding for travel and membership dues. Ms. Shuman-Johnson noted a supplemental request for a new computer system to serve the Victim/Witness Program and responded to questions from Mrs. O'Bannon relating to the numbers and types of persons receiving assistance through the program.

The Board recessed at 3:56 p.m. and reconvened at 4:05 p.m.

The Legislative Budget Reviews continued with the following presentation:

• Finance – Mr. Vithoulkas

Mr. Vithoulkas noted that the County had once again received awards from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) and annual budget document. He commented on the County's new auditing firm, its second year experience with Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB 45) regulations, reaffirmation of its triple-A bond rating from all three rating agencies, its low interest rate on a recent bond issue, and implementation by his department of a new cashiering system. Mr. Vithoulkas responded to questions from Mr. Kaechele concerning the current bond market and projected bond earnings for the current year. He commented on the divestiture of acid backed commercial paper, the status of the County's investment policy and Real Estate Advantage Program (REAP), his agency's new debit card system agreements with banks, and future plans for a new real estate and personal property tax billing system. Mr. Hazelett also commented on the new tax billing system and REAP. Mr. Vithoulkas and Mr. Hazelett responded to questions and comments from Board members pertaining to the new debit card system, the financial institutions used by the County, the level of the County's day to day cash balances, and trends in real estate assessment appeals.

Mr. Hazelett briefly reviewed the schedule for the following day and confirmed that staff would provide written responses to those questions asked by the Board requiring additional research.

The Board adjourned for the day at 4:26 p.m. and reconvened at 1:06 p.m. on Tuesday, March 18, 2008. Those present during this session were:

The Legislative Budget Reviews continued with the following presentations (see enclosed revised schedule as of 3/18/08):

• General Services/CAM - Mr. Proto, joined by Mrs. Fortune

Mr. Proto introduced the members of his staff who were present; expressed appreciation to the Board, County Manager, and budget staff for their support; and noted that he was pleased with his department's budget, which includes Central Automotive Maintenance (CAM). He briefly touched on his department's many operations, noted that many of its services are provided to schools as well as general government, mentioned that he represented the County on a number of regional and statewide bodies, explained the transfer of five positions from his department to the Department of Information Technology and a request for two new positions in his department, and referred to the need for additional funds to cover the operating costs for bond projects. He, Mr. Hazelett, and Ms. Stowe responded to a number of questions and comments from Board members relating to the shift of certain costs to the Department of Information Technology, contracted services, maintenance of leased space, cafeteria costs and subsidies, the County's long distance telephone service, purchasing software, sales and auctions of surplus County property, and his department's efforts to attract more minority-owned business vendors and promote energy conservation among County agencies. Mr. Thornton thanked Mr. Hazelett and Mr. Proto for establishing the County's program to attract small, woman-owned, and minorityowned (SWAM) vendors to the County's procurement process.

• Probation/VJCCA – Judge Williams, Ms. Nedervelt, and Ms. Freye

Judge Williams thanked the Board for its support of this agency's budget over the years and thanked Ms. Nedervelt for making optimal use of limited Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (VJCCA) funds. He reviewed factors contributing to an increase in families being served by the local juvenile justice system and spoke to the continuing need for programs offering alternatives to secure detention. Mr. Walter distributed two spreadsheets highlighting program utilization under VJCCA from July 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006 and from July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007 (see enclosed copies). He and Ms. Nedervelt responded to questions from Board members regarding parenting programs and programs. She and Judge Williams responded to further questions from Board members concerning how mediation hearings reduce time spent in court, factors contributing to increases in juvenile referrals, parental responsibility for juvenile conduct, and trends in juvenile crime among younger age groups.

• Juvenile Detention - Mr. Bingham, joined by Mr. Martin and Mr. Smith

Mr. Bingham introduced the members of his staff who were present and noted that the County's detention home was in its 29th year of service. He addressed facility improvements and how more intense medical conditions have impacted service levels and reviewed workload measures and staffing needs. Mr. Bingham and Mr. Drumwright responded to questions from Board members pertaining to United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) food standards, responsibilities of the food services supervisor position, the facility's capacity, family visitation policies, and resident profiles.

• JRJDC - Ms. Carrington, joined by Mr. Drumwright

Ms. Carrington spoke to the James River Juvenile Detention Commission's (JRJDC's) mission, special services, and use of volunteer and community resources. At Mr. Kaechele's request, Mr. Drumwright provided a history of how this regional organization was established, the County's responsibility for managing its resources, how costs are shared among the participating jurisdictions, and how the Commission is structured. He, Ms. Carrington, Mr. Hazelett, and Mr. Walter responded to a number of questions from Board members relating to funding of the Commission, policies for allocating the facility's beds, staffing levels and responsibilities, debt service on the facility's capital costs, state regulation, and the type of population served. Mr. Drumwright invited the Board to visit the facility in Powhatan County and complimented Ms. Carrington and her staff for doing an excellent job.

• Social Services – Ms. Crawley, joined by Ms. Steinhauser, Mr. Rozier, and Mr. Field

Ms. Crawley introduced the staff seated with her at the table and narrated a Power Point presentation on her agency's proposed budget (see enclosed copy). Her presentation highlighted statistics pertaining to Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)/Food Stamp/Medicaid caseloads, public assistance recipients, parallel growth patterns in

Henrico/statewide food stamp caseloads, children in foster care, adult services, and dollars generated by Social Services in FY 2006-07. She, Mr. Rozier, and Ms. Steinhauser responded to questions and comments from Board members regarding caseload definitions, foster care caseload trends, profiles of persons receiving adult services, Medicaid costs, revenue splits among the three levels of government, the County's experience with the use of debit cards for the food stamp program, dissemination of information for the fuel program, and sources of client referrals.

• Comprehensive Services Act – Ms. Jellie, joined by Mr. Johnson, Ms. Crawley, and Mr. Field

Ms. Jellie spoke to the complexity of this program and narrated a Power Point presentation on the Comprehensive Services Act (CSA) budget request (see enclosed copy). In addition to budget highlights, her presentation included a comparison of the numbers of children receiving services through CSA, special education costs, Governor's rates and local match, challenges, and solutions. Ms. Jellie, Ms. Crawley, Mr. Johnson, and Mr. Drumwright responded to questions from Board members and Mr. Hazelett concerning the numbers and types of Henrico children served by CSA, program costs, the relationship of this program to special education programs in the schools, major budget components, CSA's responsibility for educating clients, the local match rate for residential placements, the costs of keeping special needs children at home with their families versus placing them in residential facilities, age criteria for non-Individualized Education Plan (IEP) placements, the role of the County's Policy and Management Team in placing clients, and how federal Title IV-E funds can be used. Mr. Kaechele commented that this was a very challenging and informative presentation.

The Board recessed at 3:26 p.m. and reconvened at 3:39 p.m.

The Legislative Budget Reviews continued with the following presentations:

• Sheriff – Sheriff Wade, joined by Col. Bruce, Maj. Talley, and Mr. Powell

Sheriff Wade referred to jail population decreases during the months of January and February 2008, explained new unfunded legislation that will make local sheriffs responsible for determining the immigrant status of inmates held in local jails, thanked the public libraries for donating their old computer equipment to the jails, referred to a new agreement with the Department of Corrections, mentioned his agency's work release program, and noted that hospitalization was one of the major costs in his budget during the previous calendar year. He responded to numerous questions and comments by Board members and Mr. Hazelett pertaining to the inmate booking process, hospitalization costs for inmates, retention rates and compensation for sheriff's deputies, the State Compensation Board's procedure for determining how many positions it will fund, inmate profiles and demographics, jail capacity, the inadequacy of state funding, and problems posed by inmates with mental health issues. Mr. Thornton remarked that the Sheriff's Office is a very high quality operation that is nationally recognized and that the County needs to be sensitive to the need for competitive salaries in order to retain the agency's personnel.

• Police/Animal Protection – Col. Stanley, joined by Lt. Col. Middleton and Ms. Sobczak

Col. Stanley narrated a Power point presentation on the Division of Police's proposed budget (see enclosed copy). His presentation included slides addressing fighting crime in a changing community, crimes per 1,000 residents, other significant achievements, and proposed general fund and special fund budget highlights. Mr. Hazelett noted the impact of rising fuel costs on public safety and education agencies. Col. Stanley, Mr. Hazelett, Lt. Sears, and Lt. Col. Middleton responded to a series of questions from Board members relating to how the County contracts for fuel, rabies trends, placement rates for domestic animals in the County's shelter, the timeframe for opening the new shelter, police officer vacancy rates and morale, the status of the Police Athletic League (PAL), recent national recognition of the department for its highway safety efforts, the status of state legislation prohibiting solicitation at road intersections in the county, the County's certified crime prevention program, pay scale compression within the division and other public safety agencies, and the level of police officer pay and benefits. Mr. Thornton thanked the Division of Police for supporting the PAL program. Mr. Glover and Mr. Kaechele thanked the division for doing an outstanding job for Henrico citizens.

Mr. Johnson distributed staff's written responses to questions asked by the Board during the previous day's sessions (see questions 1 through 13 in enclosed copy of *Questions from Budget Reviews*, *March 17 – 20, 2008*). Mr. Hazelett advised that staff would be prepared to update the Board on the questions and responses at the following day's sessions.

The Legislative Budget Reviews continued with the following presentation:

• Fire/EMS/Emergency Services - Chief Smith, joined by Deputy Chief McClure, Mr. Copeland, and Ms. Smoot

Chief Smith narrated a Power Point presentation on the Division of Fire's proposed operating budget (see enclosed copy). His presentation addressed departmental accomplishments, statistics on total calls for service and Advanced Life Support (ALS) providers, proposed funding for major budget categories, and major components of the division's budget for administration and operations. Chief Smith responded to questions from Board members regarding the volume of emergency medical services (EMS) related calls for service and the proportion of the budget allocated to personnel costs. At Mr. Hazelett's request, he also updated the Board on the division's major apparatus program. Mr. Glover and Mr. Kaechele complimented the division on a good job and expressed appreciation to its personnel.

Mr. Hazelett reviewed the schedule for the following day's sessions and advised that the proposed connection fee increases would be discussed during the review of the Public Utilities budget. Mrs. O'Bannon stated that she wanted a darker color brick for the new building that will replace Fire Station No. 8.

The meeting adjourned at 5:12 p.m. and reconvened at 9:49 a.m. on Wednesday, March 19, 2008.

Mr. Hazelett noted that many departments, including the Divisions of Fire and Police, did not receive all of the funding for which they asked.

The Legislative Budget Reviews continued with the following presentations (see enclosed revised schedule as of 3/19/08):

• Public Utilities/Solid Waste/Street Lighting - Mr. Petrini, joined by Mr. Mawyer and Ms. McGuire

Mr. Hazelett advised that he and Mr. Pinkerton had worked with the Department of Public Utilities to reduce the department's proposed rate water and sewer rate increase from an original request of 11 percent to a recommended increase of 5 percent. Mr. Petrini reviewed water and sewer system maintenance activities, identified three major priorities for his department concerning the system, and narrated a Power Point presentation on the department's proposed operating budget (see enclosed copy). His presentation provided a current system overview and highlighted water and sewer revenues, expenses, and connection fees. It also included a solid waste overview and highlighted the solid waste special revenue fund and street lighting levies. During his presentation, Mr. Petrini distributed a spreadsheet offering an area connection fee comparison (see enclosed copy). He, Mr. Hazelett, and Mr. Yob responded to questions and comments from Board members pertaining to the impact of the proposed rate increase on average water and sewer customers, the revenue impact of this increase, the department's methodology for projecting growth in its customer base, outstanding debt service and the budgeted amount for capital projects, the definition of miscellaneous waste, the size of the fund balance for the water and sewer enterprise fund, criteria used by bond rating agencies for rating water and sewer bonds, proposed increases and decreases in the department's line items, current and proposed bulky waste charges, garbage collection schedules, participation rates for the Central Virginia Waste Management Authority (CVWMA's) curbside recycling program, recycling collection options for churches and small businesses, and the status of the White Oak Technology Park water and sewer repayments. Mr. Hazelett expressed concerns about the potential revenue impact on the County should Qimonda close its plant at White Oak Technology Park. Mr. Kaechele expressed appreciation for the presentation and Mr. Glover thanked the department for its recent work in the Bremo Road area.

• Real Property – Mr. Price

Mr. Hazelett reviewed the functions of this agency and noted that Mr. Price was managing the office while the County recruited a new director from outside the County. He, Mr. Price, and Mr. Pinkerton responded to questions from Board members relating to the size of the department's staff, the feasibility of using outside contractors, the square footage of properties leased by the County, the status of recommendations by the

Land Commission to restructure the department, reasons for the County's acquisition of parcels and easements, the status of land acquisition for Phase II of the John Rolfe Parkway project, and the timeframe for hiring a new director.

The Board recessed at 11:07 a.m. and reconvened at 11:14 a.m.

The Legislative Budget Reviews continued with the following presentations:

• Information Technology – Mr. Lewis and Mr. Owdom

Mr. Lewis referred to the challenges power surges pose for his department. He, Mr. Hazelett, and Mr. Owdom responded to questions from Board members regarding personnel complement increases caused by the transfer of positions from the Department of General Services, the status of voice over the Internet technology, the impact of power surges on the County's E-911 system and the system's interoperability with other localities, the department's role in future audio or video streaming of Board meetings, and the availability of data showing the County web pages most frequently accessed by County citizens.

• Technology Replacement - Mr. Walter, joined by Mr. Lewis, Mr. Owdom, and Ms. Van Gils

Mr. Hazelett reminded the Board that this fund was created several years previously to make sure that technology is available to County agencies on a recurring basis. Mr. Walter noted that 26 departments currently participate in the fund, which is primarily overseen by Ms. Van Gils. Mr. Hazelett, Mr. Walter, Mr. Owdom, and Mr. Lewis responded to questions from Board members concerning personal computer and E-911 equipment replacement cycles, fund overhead costs, technology replacement plans for the Board Room, the County's predominant reliance on desk top computers versus laptops, how the schools interface with general government on technology issues, the status of the schools' contract to replace student laptop computers, the status of statewide interoperability of telecommunications systems, and the process for surplusing old County computers.

• Public Health, Dr. Levine, joined by Ms. McCormick

Mr. Hazelett explained how the Health Department is funded and stated that Dr. Levine has done an excellent job for the County. Dr. Levine introduced Ms. McCormick and thanked the Board for its support. He reviewed the status of state funding, referred to a new infant mortality project and infectious disease program, cited working with the Board as a privilege, commented on the professionalism of the County's staff, and noted that his department is trying to operate more efficiently through electronics and other means. Dr. Levine and Mr. Hazelett responded to questions from Board members pertaining to the structure of local health departments as set forth by the state, the County's share in funding the departmental budget, changing demographics of the department's clientele, public health trends in the community, the challenges of serving clients who speak little

or no English, and the status of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) pilot dental program.

• Agriculture and Home Extension - Ms. Carter, joined by Ms. Wrigglesworth

Mr. Hazelett referred to the complexity of the Extension Office's budget because of the way the agency is funded. Ms. Carter responded to questions from Board members relating to salary increases for agency staff, the gypsy moth cycle, the recent deaths of a number of oak trees in western Henrico, and the status of the smart lawn program. Mr. Kaechele remarked that this agency provides a great service to Henrico citizens.

• Economic Development – Mr. Agostino

Mr. Hazelett, Mr. Agostino, and Mr. Vithoulkas responded to a number of questions from Board members regarding various contributions made by the Economic Development Authority to regional organizations, expected results from the recent visit by a Chinese business delegation, the level of the County's contribution to the Richmond Metropolitan Convention and Visitor's Bureau (RMCVB), how the County compares to other Virginia localities in terms of economic activity, local companies supporting computer chip manufacturers, tax payments by companies housed in the Qimonda plant, the number of foreign owned companies located in the County, contractual services in the Authority's budget for services at Qimonda, the status of debt service for White Oak Technology Park, how revenue generated by the Authority is used, the status of County contributions to the Richmond Metropolitan Authority (RMA) for The Diamond ballpark, the status of negotiations to attract a new minor league baseball team to the Richmond area, and future plans for The Diamond.

Mr. Walter distributed staff's written responses to questions asked by the Board during the previous day's sessions (see questions 14 through 18 in enclosed copy of *Questions from Budget Reviews*, *March 17 – 20, 2008*).

The Legislative Budget Reviews continued with the following presentations:

• CATC - Ms. Key-Tiller, joined by Ms. Stone and Ms. Best

Mr. Hazelett advised the Board that the Capital Area Training Consortium (CATC) was involved in ongoing discussions with the City of Richmond concerning restructuring the Workforce Investment Board to include the City. He noted that the County serves as fiscal agent for CATC. Ms. Key-Tiller and Ms. Stone responded to questions from Board members pertaining to the levels of contributions to CATC by other member localities, the County's role as fiscal agent for the agency, the change in mandated CATC partners from the Virginia Employment Commission (VEC) to the Virginia community college system, the impact of federal funding reductions on the CATC budget, local company closings and worker dislocation trends, Virginia's Career Readiness Certificate (CRC), and the reduction in the agency's proposed personnel budget. Mr. Kaechele expressed appreciation to Ms. Key-Tiller and her staff for being present.

• Planning – Mr. Emerson, joined by Ms. Graham

Mr. Emerson recognized the members of his staff who were present, advised that he was happy with the Manager's recommendations, and narrated a brief Power Point presentation on his agency's proposed budget that included slides depicting office, retail, and industrial plan of development square footage approval by year and recorded single-family lots and multi-family units by year (see enclosed copy). He responded to several questions and comments from Board members relating to commercial and residential development trends and the large recent increases in the number of hotels in the County.

• Building Inspections – Mr. Revels, joined by Mr. Bowles

There was brief discussion by Mr. Hazelett and Mrs. O'Bannon about efforts by counties in other areas of the Commonwealth to change zip codes. Mr. Revels narrated a Power Point presentation on the department's proposed budget, which provided slides depicting permit and inspection data as well as data regarding existing structures, offered a review of the new state building code, and explained the fat, oil, and grease (FOG) program supplement. He, Mr. Bowles Mr. Silber, Mr. Hazelett, and Mr. Pinkerton responded to a number of questions from Board members pertaining to the definition of condominiums, the increasing complexity of commercial inspections, anticipated increases in fire and sprinkler system inspection cases are handled and residential overcrowding complaints are resolved, changes in the new state building code, the timing and logistics of FOG inspections, and how FOG violations are reported.

• Permit Center – Mr. Tyson, joined by Mr. Pennock

Mr. Hazelett referred to the increases in the levels of activity at the County's two permit centers. Mr. Tyson presented a handout on The Permit Center containing slides depicting performance measure inquiries at the two permit centers and explaining requested resources (see enclosed copy). He responded to several questions from Board members relating to allocation of staff between the two centers and services provided at The Permit Center West. Mr. Tyson introduced Mr. Pennock, a former County employee who returned to the County to work as Assistant Director of Community Development on Mr. Tyson's staff.

• Community Revitalization - Mr. Strickler, joined by Mr. Young and Mr. Johnson

Mr. Strickler introduced the members of his staff who were present. He commented on the Commonwealth's recent approval of an enterprise zone expansion within the County and recent changes to the Commonwealth's enterprise zone program. At Mr. Hazelett's request, Mr. Strickler reviewed the County's new enterprise zone incentives and grants available to qualifying businesses. He and Mr. Young responded to several questions from Board members regarding the County's design assistance within enterprise zones and progress in revitalizing Willow Lawn and other areas along West Broad Street. Mr. Strickler narrated a Power Point presentation on his agency's FY 2006-07 highlights and accomplishments and proposed FY 2008-09 budget (see enclosed copy). His presentation included information on the enterprise zone program, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and Housing Opportunities Made Equal (HOME) programs, the Community Maintenance Program, and the Volunteer Assistance Program. He responded to further questions from Board members concerning inspector caseloads, how cases are reviewed and assigned, proactive versus complaint enforcement, the level of requests for assistance from homeowners, and voluntary compliance rates among property owners. Mr. Glover complimented the department for helping to revitalize neighborhoods and improve property values. Mr. Kaechele expressed appreciation to the agency's staff members for their efforts on behalf of the County.

• Public Works – Mr. Priestas, joined by Mr. Foster, Ms. Bazemore, Mr. Perry, Mr. Frauenfelder, Mr. Eure, Mr. Jennings, and Mr. Bryant

Mr. Priestas commented that the County Manager's recommended budget for the Department of Public Works was very satisfactory. He described the purpose and duties of a new Engineer II position requested by the department and explained several notable increases within the operating component. He, Mr. Frauenfelder, Mr. Eure, Mr. Jennings, and Mr. Foster responded to a number of questions from Board members pertaining to the status and cost of the new Geographic Information System (GIS) overfly, a Greater Richmond Transit Company (GRTC) study of the status and condition of the existing GRTC system and plans to extend the system into Chesterfield County, statistics on the County's traffic calming program, the design and costs of speed humps used by the department on certain roads, and the possible need for traffic studies on Gayton Road and in Wyndham as the result of citizen complaints. Mr. Priestas explained the purpose of the Best Management Practices (BMP) fund and Mr. Perry reviewed two major stream restoration projects within his department. Mr. Perry responded to questions from Board members relating to BMP maintenance and the BMP fund balance.

• Public Library – Mr. McKenna, joined by Mrs. Campbell and Ms. Villafranca

Mr. McKenna commented that his agency was very pleased with the Board's level of support. He and Mr. Hazelett responded to questions from Board members regarding library branch hours, the two library food cafes, self-service check out transactions, outside drop off areas for book returns, the status of appraisals and disposition of the former Innsbrook library branch, new library projects coming on line, and the schedule for

renovating the Dumbarton library branch. Mr. Kaechele and Mr. Glover thanked Mr. McKenna.

Mr. Hazelett advised that the discussion of the non-departmental budget would occur when all five Board members were present. He briefly reviewed the schedule for the following day.

The Legislative Budget Reviews continued with the following presentations (see enclosed revised schedule as of 3/20/08):

• Electoral Board/Registrar - Mr. Coakley, joined by Ms. West, Ms. Creighton, and Mr. Cheney

Mr. Coakley noted the small proposed increase in his agency's budget; the upcoming primary and general elections, including the November 2008 Presidential election; and the freezing of precincts in 2009 and 2010 during redistricting. He, Mr. Hazelett, Ms. West, and Mr. Cheney responded to questions from Board members pertaining to party participation in the June 2008 primary elections, the status of state and federal legislation addressing paper trails for electronic voting systems, the possibility of recent voting snafus in Chesterfield replicating themselves in Henrico, the volume and types of complaints that the Henrico Electoral Board has received from local voters during the past few years, future plans for dividing Sullivan's precinct in the Varina District, challenges in recruiting poll workers and the adequacy of the County's pay scale for these workers, voting attendance in European countries versus the United States, and the prospects of future legislation to allow early voting. Mr. Glover expressed concerns about the public schools being open on election days. Mr. Coakley thanked the Board for its support.

• MH/MR/SA Services - Mr. O'Connor, joined by Ms. Totty, Mr. Johnson, Ms. Goodale, and Ms. Shephard

Mr. Hazelett pointed out that the proposed budget for Henrico Area Mental Health and Retardation (MH/MR) Services, which includes Substance Abuse (SA) Services, would continue to include additional funding for Day Support Services to ensure that there are no waiting lists for these services. He commented that Mr. O'Connor and his staff provide excellent service and are recognized throughout the state. Mr. O'Connor introduced the members of his staff who were present and narrated a Power Point presentation on the Manager' proposed MH/MR proposed budget for FY 2008-09 and program trends and highlights for FY 2007 (see enclosed copy). His presentation included statistical and background information on unduplicated mental health, mental retardation, and substance abuse consumers served; disabilities of persons served; court ordered evaluations; access center activity; 24/7 crisis response; the MR waiver; improving quality of services; the impact of the Virginia Tech and MH Law Reform Commission; program evaluation and outcome measures; funding source and revenue source analysis; and major budget recommendations. Mr. O'Connor, Mr. Hazelett, Mr. Schnurman, Mr. Drumwright, Mr. Vithoulkas, and Ms. Shephard responded to numerous questions and comments from Board

members during the presentation relating to factors contributing to the large increase since 2006 in court ordered evaluations, the agency's role in responding to crises in the public schools, the number of psychiatric beds in the region, recent replacement of a non-accessible County group home, the feasibility of teaching mental health hygiene in public schools, how additional state funds for mental health services will be used, how reading on grade level is assessed, how rules issued by the new federal Center for Medicare and Medicaid Service could impact Medicaid funding, sources of Medicaid funding, the relationship between children's reading levels and their mental health, whether New Kent and Charles City are experiencing the same MH/MR/SA service trends as Henrico, the predominant age range of Henrico residents receiving substance abuse services through the agency, how the agency is addressing employee morale and keeping staff energized in a stressful work environment, the history of the CONNECT program and how it is funded, and the status of state legislation that will substitute the term intellectually disability for mental retardation.

• Recreation and Parks/Belmont Golf - Ms. Mier, joined by Mr. Luther and Ms. Evans

Ms. Mier thanked the Board and Mr. Hazelett for continuing to support the Division of Recreation and Parks. After commenting that the division is provided with outstanding resources and is proud of its work, Ms. Mier introduced the members of her staff who were present. She then showed a short video titled Making a Difference, which highlighted the County's parks and recreation system. Ms. Mier explained the proposed budget increase for her agency, including five new positions associated with completion of the renovation of Dabbs House and the Clarke-Palmore House; a new park services equipment replacement program and continuation of the facility rehabilitation program; and recommended fee increases for picnic shelters and gazebo rentals, Center Stage Summer Camp participants, and Meadow Farm Museum group tours. She referred to recent increases in the number of rounds played at Belmont Golf Course in the aftermath of course renovations to repair damages caused by Tropical Storm Gaston and noted that permits had been issued to repair the maintenance building damaged by fire. Ms. Mier and Mr. Hazelett responded to a number of questions and comments from Board members regarding the level of outstanding debt for green repairs, operation of the snack bar at the golf course, trends in golf course revenues and expenses, how proposed fee restructuring for the golf course would impact Henrico residents, the process for reserving picnic shelters at parks, how Dabbs House will be interpreted to the public, the status of the sale of prints from the Fields of Honor book, the status of murals previously on display at the Eastern Government Center and paintings previously on display at the golf course, the location of the agency's archives, and the status of plans for a Henrico museum. There was discussion between Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Hazelett concerning fundraising and possible revenue sources for the County's 400-year celebration in 2011. Mr. Donati commented on the new visitor's center in New Kent County just off of I-64.

• Non-Departmental (Cooperative Projects) - Mr. Hazelett

Mr. Hazelett distributed and reviewed a spreadsheet listing details of activities for nondepartmental County supported activities (see enclosed copy). He noted that staff was proposing increases of five percent or less for the activities recommended for funding. There was discussion by Board members, Mr. Hazelett, Mr. Walter, Mr. Vithoulkas, and Mr. Drumwright concerning staff's recommendation not to fund requests by the School for the Performing Arts (SPARC) and the Henrico Police Athletic League (PAL); the status of the Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU) Children's Medical Center and Leadership Metro Richmond (LMR); how the Richmond Metropolitan Authority (RMA) funds The Diamond stadium; the status of County funding for Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA); and the missions of Henrico Community Partners, The Read Center, Horses in Service Riding Center, Sports Backers (Metropolitan Richmond); Asian American Society of Virginia, and Organization of Chinese-Americans. Mr. Thornton suggested moving \$5,000 from the Richmond Gold Bowl to PAL and Mr. Glover suggested moving \$5,000 from the Richmond Council NLUS (Navy League) to PAL.

The Board recessed for lunch at 12:05 p.m. and reconvened at 12:32 p.m.

Mr. Hazelett and Mr. Vithoulkas responded to questions from Board members pertaining to how funding for the YWCA, VCU - Monroe Campus, and Central Virginia Foodbank would be used; the County's share of funding for Reynolds Community College's operating and capital expenses; how funds eliminated from the non-departmental (cooperative projects) category are redistributed within the County's budget; and recent There was discussion by Board members and Mr. trends in local tax delinquencies. Hazelett relating to services provided by the Central Virginia Foodbank and Meals on Wheels of Greater Richmond, the impact of the economy on the County's budget, and State lottery funding. Mrs. O'Bannon asked for more information on the Central Virginia Foodbank and the Board concurred with a request by Mr. Donati to fund FISH (Eastern Henrico County) at the level requested by the organization, an increase of \$8,500 over the County Manager's recommendation.

The Legislative Budget Reviews continued with the following presentation:

• Schools - Mr. Morton, joined by Ms. Winston, Mr. Montgomery, Ms. McBride, Mr. Bagby, and Ms. Marshall

Mr. Kaechele welcomed the School Board, Mr. Morton, and school administrators and expressed appreciation for this opportunity to create dialogue. Mr. Hazelett noted the recommended budget for education fully funded the School Board's request. Mr. Morton emphasized the School Board's very healthy partnership with the Board of Supervisors and how their collaboration benefits students and teachers. He narrated a Power Point presentation that provided a budget overview on the 2008 - 2009 school budget (see enclosed copy). His presentation addressed Henrico County Public Schools' (HCPS's) mission, goals, and recent awards; a summary of all funds; general fund revenues and expenditures; major budget increases; new positions by categories; and elementary pupil teacher ratio (PTR) and secondary class size. He, Mr. Myers, Mr. Montgomery, Ms. McBride, Dr. Murray, Mr. deLeon, and Ms. Marshall responded to questions from members of the Board of Supervisors and Mr. Hazelett regarding the replacement cycle for personal computers: school resource officers; teacher certification costs; school bus parking, communications systems, and routes; the status of programs for four-year olds; and the admissions process and funding for the Governor's School. Upon arriving, Ms. Winston thanked the Board of Supervisors for the opportunity to share the School Board's approved budget, noted the hard work of schools staff in preparing the budget, and continued the Power Point presentation by reviewing slides that addressed setting the stage and the core attributes of HCPS. There was extended discussion by members of the Board of Supervisors and School Board, Mr. Morton, and Mr. Myers concerning the percentages of HCPS students receiving college scholarships and pursuing higher education, the role of the Henrico Education Foundation, the request by SPARC for non-departmental (cooperative projects) funding, teacher shortages among minorities, the impact of the Standards of Learning (SOLs) on critical thinking, recruitment of teachers, local student population trends, the use of trailers to house classrooms and their impact on student learning, the number of new schools in the planning stages, and retaining teachers at schools with challenging environments. Mr. Glover expressed disappointment that local government is no longer being taught in the schools. Mr. Myers introduced the members of his staff who were present who were directly involved in developing the HCPS budget. Mr. Morton then introduced other members of the HCPS staff who were present.

The Board recessed at 2:28 p.m. and reconvened at 2:37 p.m.

• Capital Projects – Mr. Hazelett

Mr. Hazelett referred to the County's low ratio of employees to residents and responded to questions from Board members pertaining to this ratio. He narrated a Power Point presentation that provided a capital budget overview and highlights of the proposed annual fiscal plan (see enclosed copy). His presentation addressed capital improvement program (CIP) requests and funding sources, an historical depiction of pay-as-you-go funding for the capital budget, and proposed capital improvement projects. He noted that the CIP did not include certain school projects which the Board might later consider funding through Virginia Public School Authority (VPSA) bonds. Mr. Hazelett, Mr. Petrini, and Mr. Priestas responded to questions from Board members pertaining to future plans for the County's landfill, the status of school roof replacement funds, the use of landfill revenue, the location of Fire Station No. 9, road projects included in the CIP and funding sources for these projects, the status of improvements to Fire Station No. 8, the cost of additions and renovations to Henrico High School, the source of funding for utilities CIP projects, and the timing of the next general obligation bond referendum.

Mr. Hazelett reviewed the schedule for the Board's public hearing on the budget and approval of the budget and tax rates. He thanked the Board for its patience during the Legislative Budget Reviews. Mr. Kaechele remarked that it had been an intense four days with a lot of information provided. He stated that it is healthy for the Board to have these budget briefings. On behalf of the Board, Mr. Kaechele thanked Mr. Hazelett, the Department of Finance's Management and Budget Division, and all of the staff persons who presented information to the Board.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:10 p.m.

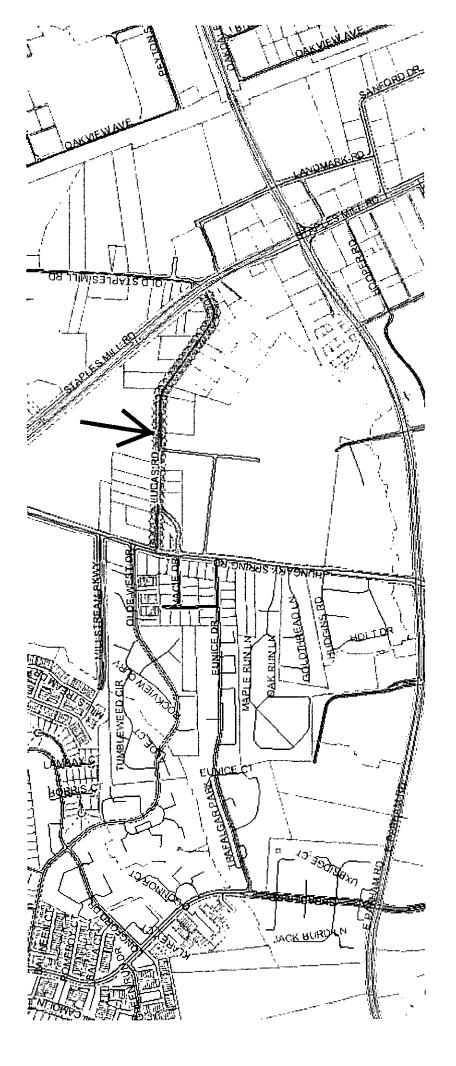

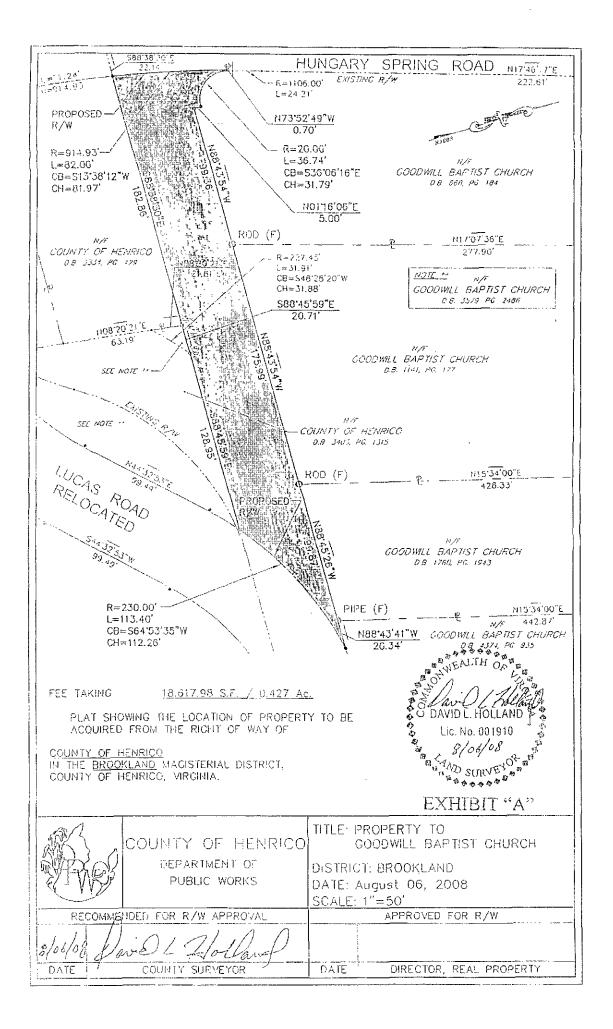

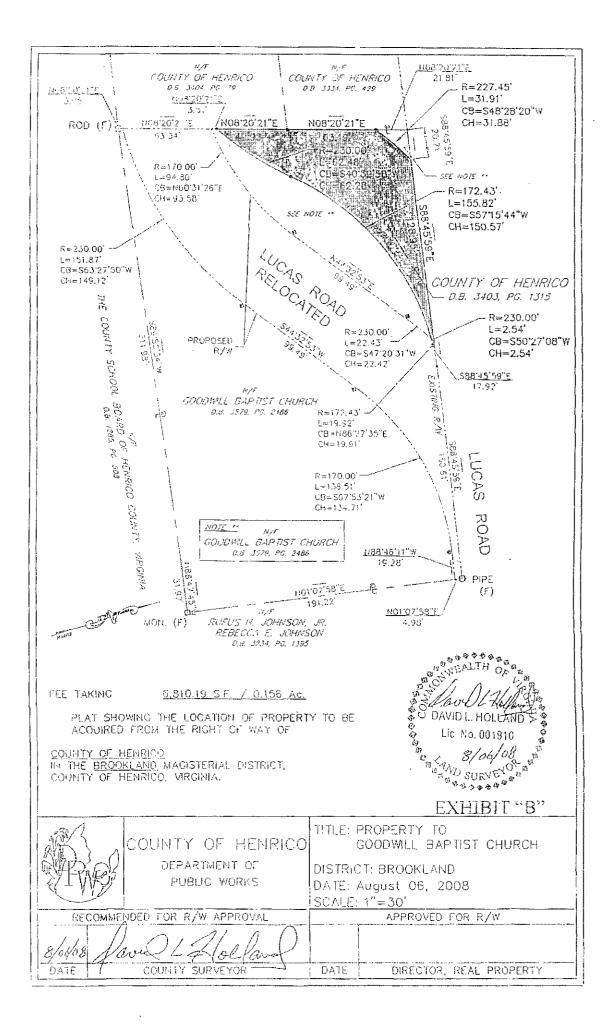

RESOLUTION — Signatory Authority — Water Agreement — Transfer of Potable Water System from Capital Region Airport Commission to Henrico County

The Capital Region Airport Commission (the "Commission") is a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia and is the owner and operator of Richmond International Airport. The Commission owns and operates an internal potable water distribution system on Airport property to serve itself and its tenants. The water system operates as an exempt waterworks system under a permit from the Virginia Department of Health. All of the water distributed through the Airport water system is purchased from Henrico County and is delivered by the County through four master water service meters.

The Commission wishes to transfer the Airport water system to the County upon completion of improvements made at the Commission's expense to bring the system to the required standards of the County. The County approved the plans for these improvements in July 2008, and construction is underway. Upon completion of the improvements and the proposed transfer, the County will own, operate and maintain the water system. The County will deliver water to the Airport and each of its tenants through individual meters located at each customer's facility in accordance with County standards. The Airport will provide easements for all of the water lines and appurtenances located on its property.

County staff has prepared a water agreement that would supersede previous water agreements covering the Airport property, including the water agreement currently in effect between the Commission and the County dated June 30, 1999. The proposed Agreement does not apply to the storm water or sanitary sewage disposal systems located on the Airport property.

RESOLUTION — Signatory Authority — Central Vírginia Waste Management Authority — Agreement for Curbside Recycling and Processing of Recycling Materials from Drop-Off Recycling Centers

This resolution authorizes the County Manger to execute an agreement with the Central Virginia Waste Management Authority (CVWMA) for curbside collection of household recycling materials and for processing of recycling materials from 14 drop-off centers located in Henrico County. Tidewater Fibre Corp (TFC) of Chester, Va. will serve as the subcontractor to provide services for the CVWMA. Under this agreement, the following services will be provided by CVWMA and TFC:

- Collection of curbside recycling materials from approximately 86,000 homes in Henrico County every other week. The County will pay \$1.90 per home per month to CVWMA for curbside recycling, for an annual cost of approximately \$2,100,000.
- Processing of recycled materials from 14 drop-off facilities in Henrico County. TFC will charge \$5 to \$10 per ton for this service, depending upon the material recycled, for an annual cost of approximately \$10,000.

The agreement is for a seven-year term beginning on July 1, 2009 and ending on June 30, 2016. There is one seven-year renewal available under the terms of the contract.

The Director of Public Utilities recommends approval of this Board paper, and the County Manager concurs.
