COUNTY OF HENRICO, VIRGINIA BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REGULAR MEETING April 14, 2009

The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a regular meeting on Tuesday, April 14, 2009 at 6:00 p.m. in the Board Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico County, Virginia.

Mr. Kaechele called the meeting to order at 6:01 p.m. and led recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

Rev. Mark D. White, Pastor, Chamberlayne Baptist Church, delivered the invocation.

PUBLIC HEARING

98-09 Resolution – Adoption of Operating and Capital Annual Fiscal Plans For Fiscal Year 2009-10 and Allocation of Car Tax Relief for Tax Year 2009.

Mr. Hazelett presented the FY 2009-10 proposed budget and referred to copies of the budget and the "Budget in Brief" document that were available to citizens in the audience. He cited three core ideals used when developing this difficult budget – no increase in citizens' tax/fee burden, no decrease in service levels, and no staff layoffs – and noted that the proposed budget fully meets all fixed costs while maintaining service levels, the operating funding request of the School Board, and the County's

FY 2009-10 debt service obligations. The budget also funds the operating costs of new facilities in FY 2009-10, which will open in Fall 2010; provides real estate tax relief to senior citizens; and looks forward to FY 2010-11 and beyond. Mr. Hazelett reviewed the proposed operating budget, including the general fund and department highlights, and also reviewed the proposed capital budget and five-year capital improvements program. He concluded his presentation by identifying concerns regarding the FY 2010-11 budget and summarizing the challenging revenue picture in light of the current economic climate.

Mr. Hazelett responded to several questions from the Board regarding employee salaries and anticipated shortfalls in State funding. There were several comments from Board members pertaining to the Board's extensive review of the budget with County departments, the criteria used by the Manager in developing the budget, the County's prudent fiscal management and triple-A bond rating, and the absence of tax and fee increases without a reduction in services or the County's personnel complement.

During the public hearing on this item, the following pre-registered speakers thanked the Board for continuing to finance their agencies – Ross Hotchkiss, a member of the Feedmore, Inc. Board of Directors; and Jason Young, Executive Director of the Community Futures Foundation that operates The Mill House. Also, Sherry Sexton, a representative of Parents for Community Based Services, and her son, Danny, thanked the Board for continuing to provide additional funding to Mental Health/Retardation Day Support Services to ensure that the waiting list for these services is eliminated.

The following pre-registered speakers, who are residents of the Varina District, voiced support for a new high school in eastern Henrico and asked the Board to include funds in the FY 2009-10 capital budget for planning this facility - Bruce Richardson, Tammy Gartrell, Bobby Mawyer, and Gay Lund. The following Varina District residents who were not pre-registered also addressed the Board on this issue - Donna Loving, Carol Eldrod, Baron Blakley, Tara Adams, Deanna Parker, Duriechee Friend, Ann Akers, Sherry Sensabaugh, Judy Christopher, Megan Fletcher, Gregory Jackson, and Joyce Davis. Mr. Blakley submitted also submitted written comments for the record, which included four charts showing a magisterial district breakdown of 2007-08 high school SOL pass rates, 2006-07 SAT scores, 2007-08 offense incidents per 100 students in the elementary and high school population, and percentages of 2008 high school graduates planning to attend college. Ms. Adams submitted citizen petitions for the record, which urged elected County officials to restore planning funds for the East Area High School in the 2009-10 CIP. Carol Akers, a resident of the Tuckahoe District, objected to including funds in the County budget for charitable or community organizations. Jennifer Andrews, President of the Henrico Education Association, thanked the Board for not laying off staff and indicated she would like to see funding for a merit or cost of living increase for school employees.

At the conclusion of the public hearing, Finance Director John Vithoulkas and Mr. Hazelett responded to a number of questions from Mr. Donati and other Board members pertaining to school capacity issues, the status of unencumbered capital project funds in the education budget and anticipated federal stimulus funds that will be designated for education, the feasibility of a general obligation bond issue on the proposed high school, and the feasibility of another referendum on the meals tax to raise revenues for capital projects. Mr. Glover commented on the complexity of putting a budget together and the loss of state revenues, complimented Mr. Hazelett and his staff for their work on the budget, and complimented Mr. Donati for uncovering unspent funds within the schools. Mr. Kaechele acknowledged that there are a lot of issues that the Board of Supervisors will need to work through with the School Board and commented on the County's past successes and bond referenda. Mr. Thornton observed that the Board of Supervisors and School Board will continue to come together to provide what the students need as has been the case in the past and that it was positive to see a coalition of citizens come together in a positive effort of support for education in the 21st century.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mrs. O'Bannon, the Board deferred this item to the April 28, 2009 meeting.

PUBLIC HEARINGS - REZONING CASES AND PROVISIONAL USE PERMIT

51-09 C-4C-09 Brookland

Arthur S. McGurn: Request to rezone 0.09 acres from B-2C Business District (Conditional) to C-1 Conservation District and conditionally rezone 0.18 acres from C-1 Conservation District to B-2C Business District (Conditional), part of Parcel 770-767-7982, located at the northeast intersection of Mountain Road and John Cussons Drive. The applicant proposes a conservation area and extension of office development. The uses will be controlled by zoning ordinance regulations and proffered conditions. The Land Use Plan recommends Commercial Concentration and Environmental Protection Area. The Planning Commission voted to recommend the Board of Supervisors grant the request.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mr. Thornton, the Board deferred this item to the May 12, 2009 meeting.

101-09 C-6C-09 Three Chopt 8516 Fordson, LLC: Request to conditionally rezone from O-1C Office District (Conditional) and R-3 One-Family Residence District to O-2C Office District (Conditional), Parcels 756-750-3871 and 756-750-5679 and part of Parcel 756-751-2001, containing approximately 2.272 acres, located at the northeast intersection of N. Parham and Fordson Roads. The applicant proposes an expansion of Pembrooke Office Park. The use will be controlled by zoning ordinance regulations and proffered conditions. The Land Use Plan recommends Office and Suburban Residential 1, 1.0 to 2.4 units net density per acre. The Planning Commission voted to recommend the Board of Supervisors grant the request.

Jean Moore, Assistant Director of Planning, responded to questions from the Board regarding the building and buffer proposed for this site. Mr. Kaechele thanked residents of Fordson Road for sitting through a long prelude to this zoning case and acknowledged there were concerns and opposition relating to the case. Jim Theobald, the applicant's representative, presented the case. He addressed the site's zoning and development history, planned site improvements and elevations, and proffered conditions offered by the applicant as revised based on neighborhood meetings. He responded to questions from the Board pertaining to the proposed buffer, landscape plan, signage, and existing rental homes on the site. Mr. Theobald stated for the record that the applicant will not place movable message signs on the site.

The following persons spoke in opposition to this case: Denise Bethel, representing her mother, who lives to the north of the site next door to Trinity

Lutheran Church, and other residents of the Parham/Fordson/Lansdowne neighborhood; John Cather, a resident of 8517 Fordson Road; and Charlie Brooking, a resident of 8514 Fordson Road. Ms. Bethel expressed concerns relating to the size of the building and how it will be buffered, parking lot lighting, traffic that will be generated by the site, and the amount of existing vacant commercial property along the Parham Road corridor. She identified for Mr. Kaechele the lots owned by the church and parking areas used by the church for Sunday services. Mr. Cather conveyed concerns regarding the impact of the proposed development on the adjoining residential neighborhood and the value of his home. Mr. Brooking submitted a list of signatures of residents opposed to the case and voiced concerns about lighting, traffic, and noise that would be generated by the expansion of Pembrooke Office Park.

Mr. Theobald responded to further questions from the Board pertaining to traffic, the proposed buffer, vacancy rates along the Parham Road corridor, parking lot lighting, and the alignment of the parking lot entrance. Cametas, also representing the applicant, confirmed that no drug testing will be Dr John Cametas, another applicant representative, conducted on the site. clarified building elevations for Ms. Bethel. Ms. Bethel disputed Mr. Theobald's assertion that most of the commercial vacancies along the Parham Road corridor are retail rather than office. In response to questions from the Board, Ms. Moore elaborated on staff's recommendation in support of the case. There was considerable discussion by the Board, County Traffic Engineer Michael Jennings, Mr. Hazelett, Dr. John Cametas, and Mr. Theobald pertaining to the location of a new driveway that would be used to access the site. Ms. Moore explained for Mr. Thornton how staff determines that a case like this is not intrusive to nearby neighborhoods.

Mr. Kaechele commented that the quality of the proposed development and buffering would be fitting for the location. He further commented that the proposed development would not pose traffic problems, would be a compatible use for the area, and would not negatively impact property values. There was discussion between Mr. Brooking and Mr. Kaechele about the number of parking spaces proposed for the site and how the proposed development would affect Mr. Brooking's property values. Mrs. O'Bannon stated that she was voting against the case because she felt it could be improved.

On motion of Mr. Donati, seconded by Mr. Glover, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved Agenda Item No. 101-09(C-6C-09) subject to the following proffered conditions:

1. <u>Conceptual Plan</u>. Development of the Property shall be in general conformance with the Conceptual Plan dated January 27, 2009 entitled "Rezoning Exhibit Pembrooke Henrico County, Virginia", prepared by Koontz-Bryant, P.C. attached hereto (the "Concept Plan") (see case file), which Concept Plan is conceptual in nature and may vary in

detail, unless otherwise requested and specifically approved at the time of Plan of Development.

- 2. Elevations. Any buildings constructed on the Property shall be in general conformance with the architectural appearance shown on the elevations dated January 24, 2009, entitled "Pembrooke Center Richmond, Virginia", prepared by Architectural Design Services, Inc., AIA, attached hereto (see case file), unless otherwise requested and specifically approved at the time of Plan of Development. The exposed portion of each exterior wall surface (front, rear and sides) of any building (excluding rooftop screening materials for mechanical equipment, windows. doors, breezeways. gables. and architectural design features) shall be predominantly brick with decorative features of alternate materials such as E.I.F.S., vinyl, wood, or cementitious siding, unless different architectural treatment and/or materials are specifically approved with respect to the exposed portion of any such wall at the time of Plan of Development.
- 3. <u>Setbacks.</u> No portion of any building shall be constructed within ninety (90) feet of the eastern boundary, nor within sixty (60) feet from the northern boundary, exclusive of accessory structures, unless otherwise requested, and specifically approved, at the time of Plan of Development.
- 4. <u>Height.</u> No building constructed on the Property shall exceed thirty-five (35) feet in height, unless otherwise requested and specifically approved at the time of Plan of Development.
- 5. **Buffers.** A suitable dense evergreen screen of plantings as determined at the time of Landscape Plan shall be maintained in a minimum of a twenty-five (25) foot wide area along the eastern boundary of the Property which shall meet the transitional buffer 25 standards, and thirty-five (35) feet along the northern boundary of the Property which shall meet transitional buffer 35 standards, except to the extent necessary, or allowed, for utility easements, grading, driveways and other purposes requested and specifically approved, or if required, at the time of Plan of Development. The existing plantings in the buffer area will be maintained to the extent reasonably practical and supplemental landscaping will be provided as approved or required at the time of Landscape Plan approval. Underbrush, fallen, diseased or dead plant growth may be removed from the aforesaid buffer area. At least a ten (10) foot wide strip along the Fordson Road frontage shall be landscaped to meet the standards of transitional buffer 10, except to the extent necessary, or allowed, for utility easements, grading, driveways and other purposes requested and specifically approved, or if required, at the time of Plan of Development.

- 6. Parking Lot Lighting. Parking lot lighting standards and fixtures shall not exceed thirteen (13) feet in height, shall be residential in character and of a quality and height generally consistent with the parking lot lighting standards and fixtures on the adjacent property which was the subject of Case No. C-46C-91. Parking lot lighting fixtures shall not produce a lighting intensity in excess of one-half (1/2) foot candle along the boundaries of the Property, except where adjacent to the property which was the subject of Case No. C-46C-91. Parking lot lighting shall be reduced or turned off after business hours (except when the parking lot is being used for church functions) and with the exception of minimum lighting requirements for security purposes.
 - 7. Other Lighting. Exterior lighting on the structures shall be positioned in such a manner as to minimize the impact of such lighting on adjacent residential areas and be of such type as approved or required at the time of Plan of Development, and after business hours will be reduced to a level sufficient for security and safety purposes.
- 8. <u>Use Restrictions.</u> The use of the Property will be restricted to those uses permitted in the O-2 Office District with the exception that the Property shall not be utilized for any of the following:
 - a. banks, savings and loan, or small loan establishments, drive-in or otherwise;
 - b. funeral home or undertaking establishments; and
 - c. child care center.
- 9. **No Mobile Signs.** No mobile sign shall be placed on the Property.
- 10. <u>Underground Utilities.</u> Except for junction boxes, meters and existing overhead utility lines and technical or environmental reasons, all utility lines shall be underground.
- 11. <u>Trash Enclosures.</u> Enclosure areas for any dumpsters on the Property shall be constructed of brick on three (3) sides that is complementary to that which is utilized in the primary building. The fourth side shall be gated with an opaque material other than wood. The location of any enclosures for dumpsters shall be determined at the time of Plan of Development.
- 12. Hours of Construction. The hours of exterior construction, including operation of bulldozers and other earthmoving equipment, shall only be between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday, except in emergencies or where unusual circumstances require extending the specific hours in order to complete work such as concrete pours or utility connections that cannot be interrupted. Signs, in both English

and Spanish, stating the above-referenced provisions shall be posted and maintained at all entrances to the Property prior to any land disturbance activities thereon.

- 13. <u>HVAC.</u> Heating and air conditioning equipment, any recycling receptacles, and any utility meters and/or boxes shall be screened from public view at ground level at the Property line in a manner approved at the time of Plan of Development.
- 14. <u>Severance.</u> The unenforceability, elimination, revision or amendment of any proffer set forth herein, in whole or in part, shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the other proffers or the unaffected part of any such proffer.
- 15. <u>Public Address.</u> No outside public address, loudspeaker, paging or speaker system audible beyond the boundary lines of the Property shall be permitted.
- 16. <u>Detached Signage.</u> Any detached signs shall be ground-mounted, monolithic-type signs and shall not exceed ten (10) feet in height, the base of which shall be landscaped.
- 17. Trash Removal; Parking Lot Cleaning/Leaf Blowing. Trash pickup from the Property shall be limited to the hours between 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. Monday through Friday and between 9:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. on Saturday. There shall be no trash pickup on Sundays. Parking lot cleaning and leaf blowing on the Property shall be limited to the hours between 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m., exclusive of snow removal.
- 18. **Burning.** During the period of construction on the Property, there shall be no burning of natural materials or construction debris.

102-09 C-5C-09 Fairfield Brook Run Somerset LLC: Request to amend proffered conditions accepted with Rezoning Case C-33C-04, on Parcels 784-749-1627 and 784-748-0982, located on the west line of Brook Road (U.S. Route 1), approximately 875 feet south of its intersection with Hilliard Road (State Route 161). The applicant proposes to amend Proffer 2 related to age restrictions to reduce the minimum age restriction from 62 to 55 and delete Proffer 3 related to enforcement of age restrictions. The total number of units would remain the same. The existing zoning is R-5C General Residence District (Conditional). The Land Use Plan recommends

Commercial Concentration and Environmental Protection Area. The site is in the Enterprise Zone. The Planning Commission voted to recommend the Board of Supervisors grant the request.

Ms. Moore and Mr. Hazelett responded to questions from the Board regarding the impact of the proposed lowering of the age limit on the zoning case previously approved for this site and the enterprise zone in which the property is located and additional questions regarding how age restriction proffers are monitored and enforced.

Sharon Brownlee, a resident of 7505 Seminary Avenue expressed concerns relating to the proposed proffer amendment. She was also speaking on behalf of Sandra Glass, a resident of 7512 Seminary Avenue, and Cathy Turner, a resident of 1216 Wilkinson Road. Ms. Brownlee stated that the age 62 restriction allowed for diversity among public housing developments and that the site has a long history of being declared incompatible for building any types of housing developments. Ms. Brownlee read a written statement and submitted a copy for the record. Cindy White, another nearby resident, voiced opposition to the applicant's request. She sited distrust of the developer of this site and disappointment with the County for not directly contacting all property owners in the area about the proposed change in proffered conditions.

Mr. Thornton commented that he would request a deferral of this case in order to reconsider data and research issues that had been raised.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Glover, the Board deferred this item to the May 12, 2009 meeting for decision only.

103-09 P-19-08 Three Chopt Towne Center West, LLC: Request for a Provisional Use Permit under Sections 24-58.2(d), 24-58.2(a), 24-120 and 24-122.1 of the County Code in order to allow outside dining and extended hours of operation for a proposed restaurant in the Towne Center West Shoppes, on part of Parcel 735-764-7344, located approximately 660 feet north of West Broad Street (U. S. Route 250) approximately 1,200 feet west of its intersection with N. Gayton Road. The existing zoning is B-2C Business District (Conditional). The Land Use Plan recommends Mixed Use Development. The site is in the West Broad Street Overlay District. The Planning Commission voted to recommend the Board of Supervisors grant the request.

Ms. Moore responded to questions from the Board concerning the proposed hours of operation for the subject restaurant.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this case.

On motion of Mrs. O'Bannon, seconded by Mr. Donati, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved Agenda Item No. 103-09(P-19-08) subject to the following conditions:

- 1. No outdoor live music performances shall be permitted.
- 2. The operator shall not permit food preparation outside the enclosed building.
- 3. The outside dining area shall not be in operation between 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.
- 4. Prior to operation of the outdoor dining area, the applicant shall submit a site plan of the restaurant and outdoor dining area and obtain Administrative Approval from the Planning Department. The site plan shall show the location of any relocated street furniture, trees/landscaping, and utility lines. Such site plan shall also show landscaping within or along the perimeter of the outdoor dining area to address the reduction and relocation of landscaping, including trees.
- 5. A clear, continuous, and unobstructed pedestrian path not less than 4' in width shall be required for pedestrian circulation between the outdoor dining area and the sidewalk curb.
- 6. Barriers to the sidewalk and parking area shall be installed and shall complement the building façade as well as any street furniture. The railings shall not exceed 36" in height and shall consist of commercial grade material for durability. Unless otherwise approved by the Planning Commission, the outdoor railing enclosure shall conform to "Exhibit C" (see case file).
- 7. Outdoor lighting fixtures shall complement the style of building. Lighting fixtures shall be from a concealed source and shall not produce glare for motorists or pedestrians on the adjacent rights-of-way and parking areas and shall illuminate only the outdoor dining area.
- 8. Trash receptacles shall be provided and properly serviced to control litter generated by this use.

- 9. This permit shall apply only to the tenant space to be occupied by Emilio's restaurant and shall not apply to any other business in the overall shopping center.
- 10. Access to the outdoor dining area shall be available only through the interior of the restaurant, except during an emergency when a patio fence exit gate may be utilized.
- 11. Prior to operation, the applicant shall consult with the Special Services Unit within the Division of Police to discuss crime prevention recommendations and conduct a security survey of the property and restaurant operations. The applicant shall implement mutually agreed upon security recommendations.
- 12. Due to the location of existing water and sewer easements, the applicant and/or owner acknowledges their responsibility for any and all damages resulting from the County's need to access and repair the lines.
- 13. The applicant/owner shall be responsible for relocating any street trees or furniture that is displaced by the outdoor dining area.
- 14. Hours of operation shall be extended until 2 a.m. for the interior use of the restaurant only.
- 15. The facility's windows shall not be tinted or obscured by posters, advertisements, or similar materials in order to permit surveillance opportunities both from within and from the outside of the building. This shall not prevent blinds from being used during daylight hours.
- 16. If calls for police service or other activities on the site dictate the need for security cameras (as determined by the Division of Police), the applicant shall install such cameras. The security cameras and video system shall be designed by a security specialist and shall meet the requirements of the Crime Prevention Unit of the Division of Police.
- 17. The owner or operator shall provide adequate lighting for the entrances, exits, and parking areas serving the use or location. "Adequate lighting" means lighting sufficient for clear visual and security camera surveillance.
- 18. In the event that evidence (i.e. police calls to the premises or complaints from other businesses) indicate that extended hours of operation is having an adverse effect (i.e. increased public nuisance, loitering, excessive noise outside the building, criminal assault, etc.) on the surrounding area, the Board of Supervisors may hold a public hearing to consider revoking the provisional use permit.

The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a special meeting on Tuesday, April 14, 2009 at 4:30 p.m. in the County Manager's Conference Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico County, Virginia.

Mr. Kaechele called the meeting to order at 4:37 p.m.

Mr. Hazelett announced that the agenda items would be presented in reverse order so that the 2009 Legislative Recap could be presented during dinner.

Energy Generation at Springfield Landfill

Mr. Hazelett recognized Art Petrini, Director of Public Utilities, who narrated a Power Point presentation on this topic. Mr. Petrini offered background information on energy generation at Springfield Landfill, noting that the landfill produces methane gas at 900 cubic feet per minute that is currently burned in a flare. The methane is an energy source but is not providing any revenue for the County. The County received six proposals from specialized Landfill Gas (LFG) to energy firms in response to a request for proposals (RFP) issued on August 29, 2008 titled "Energy Utilization of Landfill Gas and Greenhouse Gas Credits." Two firms were interviewed and INGENCO Distributed Energy, a Henrico based company, was selected. Mr.

Petrini briefly reviewed INGENCO's history and reputation. He also reviewed the benefits of this proposed methane energy agreement, which is projected to generate annual revenues for the County of \$200,000 to \$400,000. Mr. Petrini's presentation also addressed Greenhouse Gas Credits, which is another potential revenue source for the County, and the location and design of the proposed INGENCO generating plant.

Steve Yob, Solid Waste Division Director for the Department of Public Utilities, and Jerry Walker, Energy Manager for the Department of General Services, assisted Mr. Petrini in responding to questions from the Board regarding the number of engines that would be used in the proposed plant; the horsepower, safety record, and fuel consumption of the engines; the design of a diesel tank that would be located outside the plant in a contained area to operate the plant when it is not using landfill gas; and the cost effectiveness of the proposed generating facility. Mr. Walker elaborated on the design of the facility's exhaust system and mufflers in response to concerns expressed by Mr. Glover about the adequacy of the facility's design in absorbing and reducing sound. Mr. Glover would like assurances that there will be minimal noise impact on nearby residential neighborhoods. Mr. Hazelett advised that staff will further investigate these concerns and provide the Board with additional information relating to the facility's sound coefficients and the possibility of including sound barriers on the site. Sound level issues will be resolved before the Board is asked to take formal action on the RFP. Petrini clarified for Mr. Thornton the location of the six landfill gas facilities currently operating in other areas of the Commonwealth. Mr. Thornton noted the importance of ensuring that the plant proposed for the Springfield Road Landfill is built correctly.

The Board recessed for dinner at 5:04 p.m. and reconvened at 5:10 p.m.

Mr. Hazelett updated the Board on telephone calls and correspondence he has received from citizens concerning the status of capital funds to plan for the new eastern area high school. There was also discussion with the Board regarding how unanticipated revenues such as federal stimulus funds will be addressed in the County's budget.

2009 Legislative Recap

Mr. Hazelett recognized Mike Schnurman, Legislative Liaison, who narrated a Power Point presentation that provided a recap of the 2009 Legislative Session. Mr. Schnurman reviewed the outcome of two bills sponsored by the County, one to acknowledge the 75th anniversary of the Henrico Division of Police and the other to study the distribution of local revenue. He also reviewed the status of constitutional amendments introduced during the session addressing property tax exemptions for the elderly and disabled as well as disabled veterans, the Homestead Act, and the restoration of civil rights, and reviewed the status of legislation relating to a regional transportation authority, elections, local authority, and budget interaction.

During Mr. Schnurman's presentation, Mrs. O'Bannon commented on the Homestead Act and Mr. Glover commented on the history of annexation immunity and House Bill 599 funding. Mr. Kaechele noted that the presentation offered by the County at the dinner meeting with the County's legislative delegation in November 2008 succeeded in making the delegation more

sensitive to the local fiscal impact of bills considered during the 2009 session. He further noted that it was generally a good session for the County.

Mr. Hazelett briefly reviewed the evening's regular meeting agenda, noting that five persons had signed up in advance to speak at the public hearing on the budget. He explained the format of the budget presentation and public hearing. Mrs. O'Bannon suggested that the Board of Supervisors hold joint meetings with the School Board to build relationships and camaraderie. Mr. Hazelett pointed out that any such sessions would have to be advertised as public meetings and also pointed out that the Board of Supervisors and general government staff share information differently than do the School Board and education staff. Mr. Hazelett advised that the applicant for one of the five zoning cases scheduled for public hearing on the evening's agenda had requested a deferral.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 5:49 p.m.

This Board Paper is for Board of Supervisors' approval of a revised master plan and plan of development for Twin Hickory Park, as required by Sections 24-11(b) and 24-106 of the Henrico County Code, to provide a Western Maintenance Facility consisting of a onestory, 5,745 square foot maintenance building, a service yard, two parking areas and related site improvements. This revision to POD-89-99, Northwest Park Master Plan deletes a previously proposed multi-use field and restroom building to accommodate the proposed maintenance facility and includes an additional 1.1 acre parcel of land, revised trail locations, an updated library facility layout, and an expanded shelter area. The 48.09 acre park property is located between Shady Grove Road and Twin Hickory Road, approximately 2,000 feet west of Nuckols Road on Parcels 744-771-3182 and 744-772-0941. The property is zoned A-1, Agricultural District and is located in the Three Chopt District.

The Planning Department has coordinated the review of the revised master plan of development with all County departments and has held a meeting with the project engineer and appropriate representatives of the Division of Recreation and Parks, the Department of Public Works, the Department of Public Utilities, the Division of Fire, the Division of Police, the Office of Building Construction and Inspections, and the Virginia Department of Transportation.

This matter was discussed with the Board in a work session on December 9, 2008. The Board Paper was presented to the Board at its January 27, 2009 meeting and deferred to February 24, 2009, at which time it was deferred again to April 28, 2009.

The Director of Planning recommends approval of the revised master plan, subject to the staff recommendations, the staff plan dated April 28, 2009, and the conditions listed in the Board Paper, and the County Manager concurs.

WHEREAS, on January 27, 2009, the Board of Supervisors held a public hearing to receive comments on the application for approval.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Henrico County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the application, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The Director of Public Utilities shall approve the construction plans for public water and sewer prior to beginning any construction of these utilities. The Department of Public Utilities shall be notified at least 24 hours prior to the start of any County water or sewer construction.
- 2. The parking lot shall be subject to the requirements of Section 24-98 of the Henrico County Code.
- 3. The parking spaces shall be marked on the pavement surface with four-inch wide white painted traffic lines. All lane lines and parking lines shall be white in color with the exception that those dividing traffic shall be yellow.
- 4. Sufficient, effective usable parking shall be provided. If experience indicates the need, additional parking shall be provided.
- 5. Curb and gutter and necessary storm sewer shall be constructed as shown on approved plans.
- 6. The plan of development shall be revised as annotated on the staff plan dated **January 27, 2009**, which shall be as much a part of this approval as if its details were fully described herein. Eight (8) sets of revised plans, including the detailed drainage, erosion control and utility plans shall be submitted by the design engineer who prepared the plans to the Department of Planning for final review. Upon notice from the Department of Planning that all comments have been addressed, twenty-one (21) sets of final plans for signature shall be submitted to the Department of Planning for approval signatures.
- 7. The Department of Public Works shall be notified at least 24 hours prior to the start of any construction.
- 8. A detailed landscaping plan shall be submitted to the Department of Planning for review and approval prior to the issuance of any occupancy permits.
- 9. All ground cover and landscaping shall be properly maintained in a healthy condition at all times. Dead plant materials shall be removed within a reasonable time and replaced during the normal planting season.
- 10. Prior to the approval of an electrical permit application and installation of the site lighting equipment, a plan including light spread and intensity diagrams and fixture specifications and mounting height details shall be submitted for Department of Planning review and approval. Non-recreational lighting poles should not exceed a maximum height of 25 feet.
- 11. All exterior lighting shall be designed and arranged to direct the light and glare away from nearby residential property and streets.

- 16. The contractor shall have a set of plans approved by the Director of Public Works, Director of Public Utilities and the County Manager available at the site at all times when work is being performed. A designated responsible employee shall be available for contact by County inspectors.
- 17. The property shall be developed generally as shown on the plan filed with the case, and no major changes or additions to the layout shall be made without the approval of the Board of Supervisors.
- 18. Upon completion of the improvements and prior to the certification of the permanent occupancy permit, the engineer or land surveyor who prepared the POD plan shall furnish a statement to the effect that all construction, including water and sewer, is in conformance with the regulations and requirements of the POD.
- 19. The developer shall provide fire hydrants as required by the Department of Public Utilities and Division of Fire.
- 20. Insurance Service Offices (ISO) calculations should be included on the final construction plans for approval by the Department of Public Utilities prior to issuance of a building permit.
- 21. Any necessary offsite drainage easements must be obtained in a form acceptable to the County Attorney prior to final approval of the construction plans by the Department of Public Works.
- 22. Deviations from County standards for pavement, curb, or curb and gutter design shall be approved by the County Engineer prior to final approval of the construction plans by the Department of Public Works.
- 23. Vehicles shall be parked only in approved and constructed parking spaces.







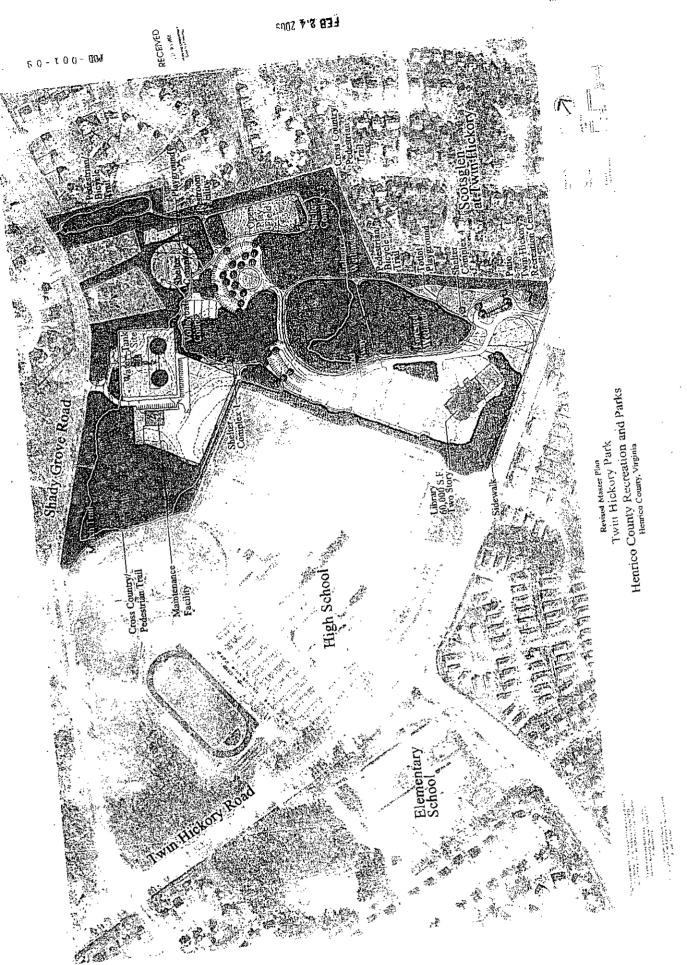


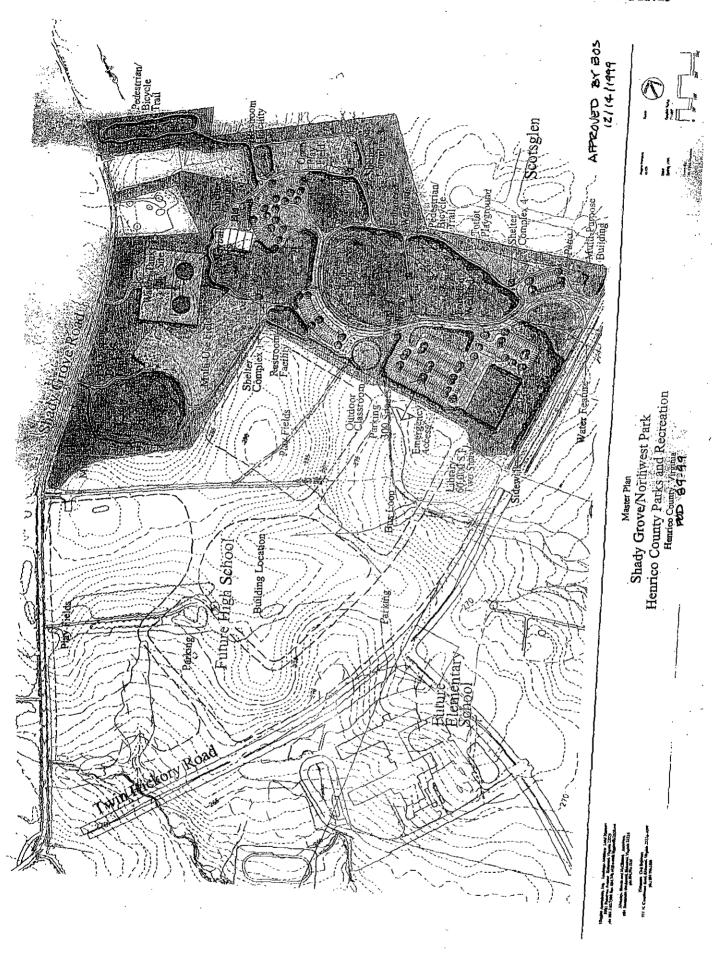


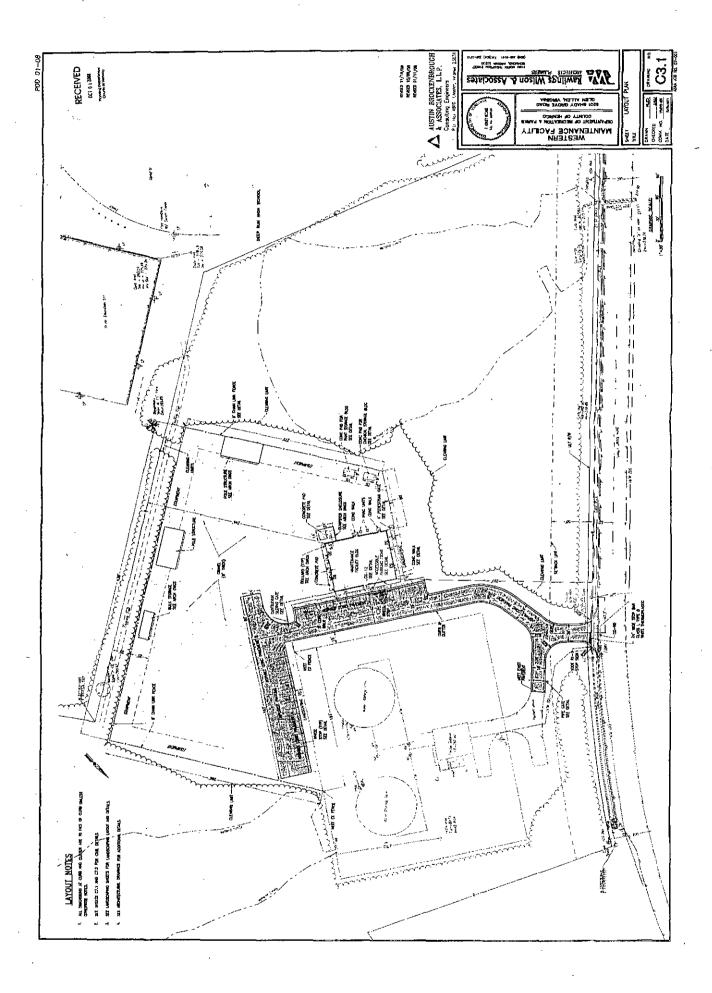

Resolution — Award of Contract — Consulting Services — Homeowner's Enhancement Guide

In Henrico County, approximately 35,000 single family homes were constructed between 1945 and 1975 and comprise approximately 40% of all single family homes in the County. Many of these homes are well built with quality materials, such as brick and hardwood flooring, in conveniently located neighborhoods with mature trees and provide affordable housing for working families.

Because of their age, size, and configuration, many of these homes need renovation or additions to keep up with more modern housing. Modernization of this housing stock would enhance the stability and desirability of these mature neighborhoods and help achieve the revitalization goals of the County.

This Board paper would award a contract to Frazier Associates to produce a Homeowner's Enhancement Guide. The Guide is intended as a resource for owners and prospective purchasers of mature homes in need of modernization and enhancement to their appearance. In addition, portions of the guide would apply to newer homes.

The Guide will contain drawings and photographs of different home styles in Henrico County and show how improvements can enhance a home's appearance. The Guide will also include information about home maintenance, energy efficiency and green renovation concepts, aging in place, universal design, landscaping and lawn care, financing of improvements, selecting a contactor, building permits, zoning, and other renovation and remodeling advice.

On February 6, 2009, the County received four proposals in response to RFP #09-8573-1CS. Based upon evaluation of the proposals, the Selection Committee (consisting of Mr. Mark Strickler, Mr. Paul Johnson, Mr. John Young, Mr. Melvin Slough, Ms Kelly Kinahan and Mrs. Cecelia Stowe) interviewed the following firms:

Frazier Associates Hill Studio

The Committee subsequently selected Frazier Associates as the first ranked firm and negotiated a fixed fee of \$84,594. The Guide will be completed by October 26, 2009.

Funding from Community Block Grant Funds is available to support this contract. The Directors of General Services and Community Revitalization recommend that the contract be awarded to **Frazier Associates** for \$84,594 in accordance with RFP #09-8573-1CS, and the County Manager concurs.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board declines to receive any salary increase for 2010 and the salary schedule attached hereto for Boards and Commissions and Unscheduled Salaries effective at the beginning of the 2009-10 fiscal year, hereby is approved; and,

- 1. Any qualifying vehicle, as defined in the PPTRA, sitused within the County commencing January 1, 2009, shall receive personal property tax relief in the following manner:
 - a. Qualifying vehicles valued at \$1,000 or less shall receive 100% tax relief;
 - b. Qualifying vehicles valued at between \$1,001 to \$20,000 shall receive 65% tax relief;
 - c. Qualifying vehicles valued at \$20,001 or more shall receive 65% tax relief on the first \$20,000 of value only; and
 - d. All other vehicles which do not meet the definition of "qualifying vehicles" will not receive any form of tax relief under the PPTRA.
- 2. The amount of tax relief shall be a specific dollar amount offset against the total personal property taxes that would otherwise be due on a qualifying vehicle but for the PPTRA. The specific dollar amount of relief shall be shown on the tax bill for each qualifying vehicle, together with a general description of the criteria upon which relief has been allocated.

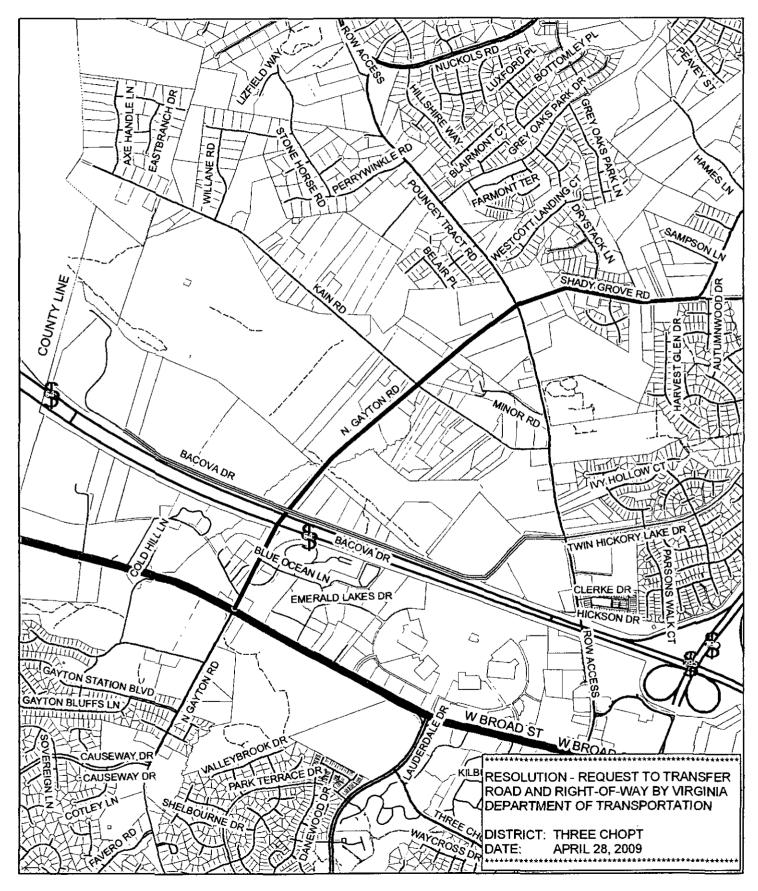
