MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Seventy-four staff members from various County departments visited the Emergency Management Institute (EMI) in Emmitsburg, Maryland from August 29 through September 2, 2010 to participate in disaster preparedness training offered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Planning for this training took two years and was coordinated through the Henrico Office of Emergency Management and Division of Fire's Planning Section. The training was provided at no cost to the County by the EMI and FEMA, and meals were covered by the Virginia Department of Emergency Management. Integrated Emergency Management Courses used in the training place emphasis on community response and short-term recovery issues. They are tailored to fit the community and are based on a selected hazard type, and included a visit to Henrico by FEMA's National Fire Academy staff. Mr. Hazelett recognized Deputy Fire Chief Rick McClure and Emergency Manager Anna McRay for their integral roles in the training process and presented polo shirts to members of the Board representing the efforts of the County's emergency management team.

211-10 P-8-10 Three Chopt Towne Center West, LLC: Request for a Provisional Use Permit under Sections 24-58.2(d), 24-120, and 24-122.1 of the County Code in order to allow outside dining for a proposed restaurant in the Towne Center West Shoppes, on part of Parcel 735-764-7376, located approximately 1,100 feet north of W. Broad Street (U.S. Route 250) approximately 1,400 feet east of its intersection with N. Gayton Road.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this case.

Joe Emerson, Director of Planning, responded to a question from Mr. Kaechele.

On motion of Mr. Kaechele, seconded by Mr. Glover, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item subject to the following conditions:

- 1. No outside live music performances shall be permitted on site.
- 2. Any outside speakers or sound system shall comply with the following standards:
 - a) Sound systems must be equipped with controls permitting full volume adjustment.
 - b) Sound from the system shall not be audible beyond 100 feet from the source.
 - c) Sound systems shall be used only when outside dining is permitted.
- 3. The operator shall not permit food preparation outside the enclosed building.

- 4. The outdoor dining area shall not be in operation between 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.
- 5. Unless otherwise approved by the Planning Commission, the outdoor dining area shall be constructed in general conformance to the "Furniture, Fixture and Equipment Plan" attached as Exhibit B (see case file).
- 6. A method of enclosure to provide separation of the dining area from the parking area shall be installed and shall complement the building façade as well as any street furniture. The railings shall not exceed 36" in height and shall consist of commercial grade material for durability. Unless otherwise approved by the Director of Planning, the outdoor railing enclosure shall conform to Exhibit C (see case file).
- 7. Outdoor lighting fixtures shall complement the style of the building. Lighting fixtures shall not produce glare for motorists or pedestrians on the adjacent rights-of-way and parking areas and shall illuminate only the outdoor dining area.
- 8. Trash receptacles shall be provided and properly serviced to control litter generated by this use.
- 9. A clear, continuous, and unobstructed pedestrian path not less than 5' in width shall be required for pedestrian circulation between the outdoor dining area and the sidewalk curb.
- 10. The applicant shall obtain Administrative Approval from the Planning Department for the design and layout of the outdoor dining area. Any exterior alterations shall meet the proffered conditions of rezoning case C-49C-04.
- 11. This permit shall apply only to the tenant space to be occupied by Osteria La Giara and shall not apply to any other business in the overall shopping center.
- 12. Access to the outdoor dining area shall be available only through the interior of the restaurant, except during an emergency when a patio fence exit gate may be utilized.
- 13. Prior to operation, the applicant shall consult with the Special Services Unit within the Division of Police to discuss crime prevention recommendations and conduct a security survey of the property and restaurant operations. The applicant shall implement mutually agreed upon security recommendations.

14. Televisions and other video display devices shall not be allowed in the outdoor dining area.

213-10 C-14C-10 Brookland Ron Swinson: Request to conditionally rezone from R-2 One-Family Residence District to R-2AC One-Family Residence District (Conditional), Parcels 766-762-5366 and 766-762-6067 containing .658 acres, located at the northeast intersection of Staples Mill Road (U.S. Route 33) and Attems Way.

Jean Moore, Assistant Director of Planning for Comprehensive Planning and Administration, noted the reasons that the Planning staff and Planning Commission had recommended denial of this case. She responded to a question from Mr. Glover.

Applicant Ron Swinson and his brother, George Swinson, presented the case. They reviewed the history of their acquisition of the property and their efforts towards development of the property. Mr. Ron Swinson requested that the County consider reimbursing him for development-related fees he had incurred to date should his rezoning request not be granted. He responded to a question from Mr. Kaechele and discussed with Mr. Glover the procedures he had taken to develop the property prior to submitting his rezoning request to the County.

Courtney Reynolds, President of the Tall Timbers Homeowners Association, advised that the association had endorsed the Planning Commission's recommendation to oppose Mr. Swinson's request. He stated that the request was contrary to the intent of the County's land use plan.

Mr. Glover commented on the process Mr. Swinson followed in trying to develop his property and noted that this would be a precedent-setting case if approved.

In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Hazelett advised that the County would return to Mr. Swinson the water and sewer connection fees Mr. Swinson previously paid to the Department of Public Utilities. Mr. Hazelett also responded to concerns expressed by Mr. Thornton regarding the accuracy of professional information that Mr. Swinson received from County offices when pursuing development of his property.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mr. Kaechele, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and denied this item.

215-10 P-7-10 Three Chopt Albert Diradour: Request for a Provisional Use Permit under Sections 24-58.2(d), 24-120, and 24-122.1 of the County Code in order to allow outside dining for an existing restaurant in Westpark Shopping Center, on Parcel 754-758-6408, located at the southwest intersection of W. Broad Street (U.S. Route 250) and Pemberton Road (State Route 157).

Mrs. Moore responded to a question from Mr. Kaechele.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this case.

Mr. Kaechele briefly commented on the applicant's preference for later hours of operation than what was recommended by the Planning staff and Planning Commission.

On motion of Mr. Kaechele, seconded by Mr. Glover, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The outdoor dining area shall not be in operation between 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.
- 2. No outside live music shall be permitted on site.
- 3. Any outside speakers or sound system shall comply with the following standards:
 - a. Sound systems shall be equipped with controls permitting full volume adjustment.
 - b. Sound from the system shall not be audible beyond 100 feet from the source.
 - c. Sound systems may be used only when outside dining is permitted.
- 4. The operator shall not permit food preparation outside the enclosed building.
- 5. The outdoor dining area shall be limited to no more than 675 square feet. The outdoor dining area shall be constructed substantially in conformance with the layout attached as Exhibit A (see case file).

- 6. Unless otherwise approved by the Director of Planning, the outdoor dining furniture shall be substantially similar to those illustrated in Exhibits B and C (see case file).
- 7. The fence surrounding the outdoor dining enclosure shall be limited to 42" in height. Unless otherwise approved by the Director of Planning, the outdoor railing enclosure shall be substantially similar to those illustrated in Exhibit D (see case file).
- 8. Access to the outdoor dining area for outdoor dining patrons shall be utilized only through the restaurant's existing Carside To Go door. Applebee's employees may use the Carside To Go door to service the outdoor dining patrons. The outdoor dining enclosure gate may be utilized by Applebee's employees for Carside To Go services and emergency purposes only. Patrons may not utilize the gate to access the outdoor dining area, Carside To Go door, or the interior of the restaurant. Signs shall be posted on the outdoor dining enclosure gate that state these requirements.
- 9. Outdoor lighting fixtures shall complement the style of the building. Lighting fixtures shall not produce glare for motorists or pedestrians on the adjacent rights-of-way and parking areas and shall illuminate only the outdoor dining area.
- 10. This permit shall apply only to Applebee's Restaurant located on Parcel 754-758-6408 and shall not apply to any other business in the shopping center.
- 11. Prior to the operation of the outdoor dining area, the applicant shall submit a site plan of the outdoor dining area and obtain administrative approval from the Planning Department. The site plan shall show the design and layout of the outdoor dining area. Proffered conditions of rezoning case C-76C-89 apply. Such site plan shall show landscaping within or along the perimeter of the outdoor dining area to address the reduction and/or relocation of any landscaping or trees to be consistent with POD-57-89.
- 12. Trash receptacles shall be provided and properly serviced to control litter generated by this use.
- 13. Prior to operation, the applicant shall consult with the Special Services Unit within the Division of Police to discuss crime prevention recommendations and conduct a security survey of the property and restaurant operations. The applicant shall implement mutually agreed upon security recommendations.

14. Televisions and other video display devices shall not be allowed in the outdoor dining area.

216-10 P-9-10 Fairfield Clearwire US LLC: Request for a Provisional Use Permit under Sections 24-95(a)(3), 24-120 and 24-122.1 of Chapter 24 of the County Code in order to retain one (1) microwave dish, replace one (1) microwave dish, and add two (2) new microwave dishes to an existing communications tower, on part of Parcel 784-758-8385, located approximately 575 feet east of the intersection of Mountain and Telegraph Roads.

Brian Bolt, a consultant representing the applicant, briefly presented the case and spoke in support of the applicant's request.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this case.

On motion of Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Donati, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item subject to the following conditions:

- 1. If the use of the tower for communications purposes is discontinued for 180 days, the tower and all related structures shall be removed from the site within ninety (90) days. Within ten (10) business days after written request by the County, the owner of the tower shall provide the County with written confirmation of the status of the tower, the number of and identity of users on the tower, available co-location space on the tower and such additional information as may be reasonably requested.
- Application for a building permit to install the tower modification must be made within one year after the Provisional Use Permit is granted by the Board of Supervisors, unless an extension of time is granted by the Director of Planning upon a written request by the applicant.
- 3. The applicant shall obtain approval from the Planning Commission should the FAA require the addition of standard obstruction marking and lighting (i.e. red lighting and orange and white striping) to the tower. Any proposed changes to the original galvanized finish of the tower shall be submitted to the Director of Planning for approval.
- 4. When site construction is initiated as a result of this Provisional Use Permit, the applicant shall complete requirements prescribed by Chapter 10 of the Henrico County Code. In particular, land disturbance of more

- than 2,500 square feet will require that construction plans include a detailed drainage and erosion control plan prepared by a professional engineer certified in the State of Virginia. Ten (10) sets of the construction plans shall be submitted to the Department of Public Works for approval.
- 5. If ownership of the lease is transferred to another provider, the new owner shall submit a Transfer of Provisional Use Permit.
- 6. The height of the tower shall not exceed 140 feet.
- 7. This permit shall apply only to the $7,800 \pm \text{square foot lease area}$ identified in Exhibit A (see case file).
- 8. Unless dead or diseased, the existing tree buffers adjoining the proposed lease area shall be preserved and shall not be pruned to reduce their height.
- Low-profile antennas or a similar style of equipment as approved by the Director of Planning which reduces the visual profile of equipment shall be installed on the tower.
- 10. The co-location of additional users, as technically feasible, shall be allowed at this site.
- 11. Prior to the co-location of any carrier's antennas or addition of equipment lease space, a revised site plan and equipment placement details shall be submitted to the Planning Department for approval.
- 12. To maintain visual and sound buffering, a supplemental landscaping plan may be required by the Director of Planning. The Director of Planning may waive the enforcement of this condition if it is deemed unnecessary.
- 13. Any UHF, VHF or other type of receivers/transmitters that would interfere with the County's Division of Police emergency communications are prohibited from this tower.
- 14. Cables may be banded to the exterior of the tower provided their color shall sufficiently match the tower's exterior color as approved by the Director of Planning.
- 15. The access driveway to the tower shall be paved.

PUBLIC HEARINGS - OTHER ITEMS

217-10 Resolution - Approval of Amendments to 2026 Comprehensive Plan - Innsbrook Area Study.

Joe Emerson, Director of Planning, narrated a slide presentation on the Innsbrook Area Land Use Study. Mr. Emerson began his presentation by reviewing the study area, existing conditions, the planning process and public input, mixed-use development in Innsbrook, development scenarios, land bays, development form and guidelines, and proposed land use. He responded to several questions from Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Kaechele regarding the meaning of the terms traditional neighborhood development and special focus area, and how the proposed Comprehensive Plan amendments would affect future rezoning requests for redevelopment of the Innsbrook area. Emerson continued his presentation by reviewing urban development areas, keystone policy topics, and the future land use map. He noted that the Planning staff and Planning Commission recommended approval of the proposed Comprehensive Plan amendments, including updates to the future land use map and chapters 5 and 12 of the plan as well as the designation of Innsbrook as a special focus area and an urban development area. At the conclusion of his presentation, Mr. Emerson responded to questions and comments from Mr. Kaechele concerning the acreage of Innsbrook, the study process, the anticipated timeframe for redeveloping Innsbrook, the role of a land use plan in guiding future development, and the County's future growth and economic development needs.

The following persons addressed the Board during the public hearing on this proposed resolution:

- Kathy Kozak, a resident of the Sadler Grove community, expressed concern about the declining value of her property due to the recession and asked the Board to consider further studies of the Innsbrook area that would address traffic, noise, and safety issues associated with the future development of this area.
- Dave Cummings, Vice President of the Cedars Homeowners Association, voiced five concerns raised by his neighbors that they felt had not been addressed in the study – environmental pollution, safety, traffic, encroachment, and infrastructure. He requested deferral of a

decision on this matter until staff incorporates these concerns into the proposed plan amendments.

- Pat Lawson, the owner of a building at 4435 Waterfront Drive, spoke in favor of the proposed plan amendments and to the success of the Stapleton urban mixed-use development in Denver, Colorado.
- Harold Bushong, a resident of the Sadler Grove community, stated concerns pertaining to proposed residential densities and building heights in Innsbrook, the inadequacy of roads serving his community to handle current levels of traffic, and the absence of bicycle routes and walking paths in the proposed plan amendments.
- Mike Normansell, President of the Sadler Green Owners Association, advised that his neighborhood was united in opposition to the proposed plan amendments because the area cannot support the proposed density of development and the residents do not want an urban mixed-use development. He remarked that the current campus setting of the Innsbrook office park is a benefit to the area. Mr. Normansell also raised concerns about the impact of higher density development on his community's quality of life and how the proposed new development will affect traffic, public services, and the environment. He pointed to the need to improve Sadler Road before changing the character of the area.
- Paul Kreckman, President of the Innsbrook Owners Association, Chairman of the Innsbrook Architectural Review Committee, and Vice President of Highwoods Properties, provided background information and statistics on the current Innsbrook office park. Although Mr. Kreckman expressed pride in the past success of the park as a powerful economic engine for the County, he cited the need to change with the times to be globally competitive and survive in today's workplace. Mr. Kreckman said that designating Innsbrook as an urban mixed-use development district is a natural and logical next step. After emphasizing the fiscal impact of Innsbrook and the importance of new investment in this area, he urged the Board to approve the study recommendations. In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Kreckman addressed how traffic issues and concerns will be addressed in Innsbrook's future development through such measures as a grid road system and public transportation. He also addressed a question from Mr. Glover regarding the projected build-out timeframe for Innsbrook.
- Bruce Kay, Vice President for Markel Corporation, commented on his company's history in Innsbrook and the expectations of a new generation of employees his company is trying to attract and retain in

today's global marketplace. He expressed his company's support for this initiative.

- Jim Theobald, a representative of the Innsbrook Owners Association and Highwood Properties, noted how the proposed plan amendments would help transition, step-up, and buffer building heights from the edge of residential neighborhoods. He also spoke to the vision of the Innsbrook development team and County staff and the opportunity to build around an existing employment base in Innsbrook.
- Beryl Saunders, a representative of H&A Architects and Engineers, alluded to two urban mixed-use development projects his firm has worked on in Hampton Roads the Virginia Beach Town Center and Newport News' Oyster Point City Center. He also mentioned the interest of younger workers in living and working in these types of communities and elaborated on the grid road system and grand central park envisioned in the future for Innsbrook. In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Saunders elaborated on the positive impact of the Virginia Beach Town Center on property values in surrounding residential communities.

At Mr. Kaechele's request, Public Works Director Tim Foster commented on the status of planned improvements to Sadler Road and Mr. Emerson explained how all of the issues and concerns expressed by citizens had been addressed in the study. Mr. Emerson also responded to further questions from Mrs. O'Bannon and Mr. Kaechele relating to residential lot sizes, densities, and open space called for in the plan amendments.

Mr. Kaechele commented on the significance of Innsbrook to the County's economic viability and employment base and the need to keep the area growing and competitive. He cited the opportunity of land use planning and pointed out that future zoning cases in this area will be evaluated and made to work within the context of the County's land use plan.

On motion of Mr. Kaechele, seconded by Mr. Glover, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item - see attached resolution.

218-10 Resolution - Condemnation - Rights-of-Way and Easements - North Gayton Road Extension Project - Hilton R. Davis, Jr. - Three Chopt District.

Jon Tracy, Director of Real Property, responded to questions from Mr. Kaechele.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this resolution.

On motion of Mr. Kaechele, seconded by Mr. Glover, and by unanimous vote, the Board approved this item – see attached resolution.

219-10 Ordinance - Vacation of Planting Strip Easements and Access Easement - Ketterley at Grey Oaks - Three Chopt District.

There was brief discussion by Mr. Kaechele and Mr. Hazelett regarding a property access issue involving an adjoining landowner.

Gibson Wright, a representative of Dominion Land & Development, requested a deferral of this item so that he could have additional time to address this outstanding issue with the County Attorney. There was discussion by Mr. Wright, Mr. Kaechele, and Mr. Hazelett concerning the County's interest and role in ensuring legal access for the landowner adjoining Dominion's property. They also discussed the period of time for which the deferral should be granted.

On motion of Mr. Kaechele, seconded by Mr. Glover, the Board deferred this item to October 12, 2010.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Vickie Beaty, a resident of the Three Chopt District, restated concerns she has previously presented to the Board regarding the impact of a commercial redevelopment project at Ridge Shopping Center on her adjoining residential property. She presented a stack of photographs depicting debris in a surface water creek on her property and views of the construction site from her backyard. Ms. Beatty responded to questions from Mr. Kaechele and Mr. Thornton about her specific concerns and shared with the Board a letter dated August 14, 2010 and directed to Randy Silber, Deputy County Manager for Community Development. In the letter, she requested removal of the light in the rear parking lot of the new Chick-Fil-A restaurant that shines into her backyard, cleaning of all debris in the creek and creek embankment that is located along her rear property line, testing of her trees and lawn to determine the cause of death to vegetation, planting of new trees behind the newly installed Chick-Fil-A fence or along her rear property line, extending the Chick-Fil-A fence along her rear property line to coincide with the sidewalk that was placed on Parham Road, and filling in of the gaps under the fence to prevent headlights from the Chick-Fil-A parking lot from shining into her backyard and rear windows.

In response to a request by Mr. Glover, Mr. Hazelett advised that he would have Mr. Silber review the plans for the Chick-Fil-A development and meet with Ms. Beaty on site to revisit her concerns and that he would report back to the Board.

The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a special meeting on Tuesday, September 14, 2010 at 5:15 p.m. in the County Manager's Conference Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico, Virginia.

Mrs. O'Bannon called the meeting to order at 5:19 p.m.

Mr. Hazelett briefly reviewed the two items listed on the special meeting agenda and advised that there would be a video presentation during dinner.

Proposed Ordinance Amendments Relating to the Award of Contracts by the Henrico Area Mental Health & Developmental Services Board

Mr. Hazelett recognized Karen Adams, Senior Assistant County Attorney, who noted that there was an introduction of ordinance on the Board's regular meeting agenda relating to this matter. Ms. Adams explained that under current state law, the Henrico Area Mental Health & Development Services (MH/DS) Board has the authority to enter into contracts for the delivery of services. According to the Virginia Code, these services include a comprehensive system of inpatient, outpatient, day support, residential, prevention, early intervention, crisis stabilization, and other appropriate individualized services and support. Mrs. Adams noted that there was an

introduction of ordinance on the Board's evening agenda that would conform the County Code to current practice, whereby the Henrico Area MH/DS Board awards contracts for the provision of services and goods for direct client use and the Director of General Services or the Board of Supervisors, as appropriate, awards contracts relating to the operation of agency facilities and business administration. Examples of contracts routinely awarded by the MH/DS Board are those for day support services for individual consumers, psychotropic medications for consumers, transportation services, detox services, methadone treatment, and psychological or psychiatric services. The Director of General Services awards contracts for computer software, telephone systems, and office supplies, furniture, and equipment. The Board of Supervisors enters into leases and purchases real estate for the agency.

Ms. Adams pointed out that the County's procurement process applies to contracts awarded by the MH/DS Board. In the case of bulk procurement, the Department of General Services' Purchasing Division issues requests for proposals (RFPs), the proposals are evaluated by a committee, and staff recommendations are made as to the award. There is an exemption under general procurement law from competitive bidding or negotiation for procurements by Community Services Boards of goods or personal services for direct use by the recipients if the procurement is made for an individual recipient. Ms. Adams informed the Board of Supervisors that the Directors of General Services and MH/DS Services recommended the proposed ordinance changes.

In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Ms. Adams explained the evolution of the MH/DS Board to a policy board some years ago. There was discussion by Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Rapisarda, and Ms. Adams concerning the County's and the Commonwealth's timeframes and processes for recodifying local ordinances and state laws.

Proposed Amendment to the Public Street Frontage Requirement for Family Divisions

Mr. Hazelett remarked that this matter was first discussed with the Board in a special meeting several months ago. He then recognized Ben Blankinship, Principal Planner for Code Support, who narrated a slide presentation on this matter. During his presentation, Mr. Blankinship reviewed the current street frontage requirement in the County Code, public policy concerns, the proposed exception for family divisions, current regulations exempting family divisions from the subdivision process, and proposed subdivision regulations that would require family divisions to be submitted to the Planning Department or Planning Commission for review and to meet zoning requirements.

There was extended discussion by the Board, Mr. Blankinship, Mr. Hazelett, and Mr. Rapisarda pertaining to a proposed regulation that would require family members to own a lot for at least 15 years as a condition of family subdivision approval. Mr. Blankinship and Mr. Hazelett also responded to a number of questions from the Board relating to a proposed subdivision regulation requiring that each lot be served by a private drive that meets Department of Public Works requirements. Mr. Blankinship then reviewed supplemental slides titled "Issues with Private Drives" that depicted three of the County's current private drive subdivisions. He responded to questions and comments from the Board regarding the private roads serving these subdivisions.

Mr. Hazelett wrapped up the presentation by identifying next steps in the amendment process. He noted that the Planning Commission previously recommended approval of a different approach that did not include changes to the subdivision ordinance. Mr. Hazelett responded to further questions from the Board concerning the rationale behind amending the County's ordinance and the possible unintended consequences of making these changes. He advised that this matter should be referred back to the Planning Commission by the Board so that the Commission could review the new approach brought forward by staff and make a new recommendation to the Board.

The Board recessed for dinner at 6:05 p.m. and reconvened at 6:15 p.m.

Mr. Hazelett recognized Dawn Miller, Director of Public Information & Television Services for Henrico County Public Schools, who introduced a 13-minute Henrico history video produced by her department for fifth grade social studies classes and the County's 400th Anniversary Commemoration. After watching the video, Mrs. O'Bannon requested copies for the Board. Mrs. Miller stated that a longer version of the video would be completed later in the week and provided to the Board. She, Ms. Harper, and Mrs. McKinney responded to questions and comments by the Board pertaining to potential audiences for this video, another new historical video that is being produced by Mrs. McKinney's department, and a third video that has been produced by Mrs. McKinney's department profiling the history of Dabbs House. Mrs. O'Bannon briefly commented on the County's 2011 Commemoration hosted events.

Mr. Hazelett reviewed the evening's regular meeting agenda and noted items for which deferrals or withdrawals were being requested. He called the Board's attention to the large budget amendment paper on the general agenda that included carryover funds from FY 2009-10. Mr. Hazelett alerted the Board to a potential public comment speaker, Vickie Beaty, who had previously appeared before the Board regarding construction of the new Chick-Fil-A restaurant on Parham Road behind her property. He updated the Board on staff's efforts to address her concerns with the developer, which currently included debris in the creek along her rear property line and dying trees. Mr. Hazelett advised the Board that United States census information should be available to the County in late February or early March 2011 and that the redistricting process would be discussed with the Board during the 2011 legislative budget reviews. There was some discussion by Mr. Hazelett and the Board relating to the status of the Governor's proposal to privatize Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) stores and the zoning and financial implications of this proposal for local governments.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 6:53 p.m.

Pursuant to Virginia Code Section 15.2-2507, a Board paper was presented on September 14, 2010, which (a) received requests for amendments to the Annual Fiscal Plan, (b) directed the advertisement of same, and (c) set the date for a public hearing. Those requirements having been met, the Board may now receive this paper, which, if approved, amends the Annual Fiscal Plan and appropriates funds for expenditure, as applicable, on September 28, 2010. After the public hearing, at that same meeting, this paper may be approved.

This paper is divided into three types of amendment requests: (1.a.) Reappropriation of FY 2009-10 funds for grant programs having an ending date after June 30, 2010; (1.b.) Reappropriation of FY 2009-10 funds not expended or encumbered as of June 30, 2010, but needed in FY 2010-11, for purposes approved and budgeted for in FY 2009-10; and (2) Appropriation of new amendment requests for FY 2010-11. New amendment/appropriation requests for FY 2010-11 include certain resources received in FY 2009-10, but not appropriated, as well as new resources anticipated in FY 2010-11.

On October 25, 1989, the Board of Supervisors approved an agreement with Camp Dresser & McKee for professional engineering services in the amount of \$12,373,486 to design the Henrico Water Treatment Plant/Raw Water Transmission project. The agreement total has been increased to \$18,649,990 by Amendments No. 1 through 9 to address state and federal permitting requirements, relocate the site from Patterson Avenue to Three Chopt Road, revise the design to increase treatment and distribution capacity from 55 to 80 million gallons per day, design building and site security improvements, provide operational service for plant start-up, develop procedures for compliance with water quality standards, and provide treatment instrumentation training for plant operators.

This resolution authorizes the County Manager to execute an amendment to the engineering services agreement in the amount of \$476,000 to increase the total contract amount to \$19,125,990 to accomplish the following tasks:

- Provide additional preliminary design, testing and reporting services to complete a rerating study and 12-month demonstration process in accordance with Virginia Department of Health requirements to increase the water treatment capacity from 55 to 80 million gallons per day.
- Provide additional design and construction administration services to provide regulatory and operational improvements for the sludge and chemical metering pumps, raw and finished water pump motor drives, ozone sampling system, carbon filtering system, and the filter-to-waste system.

The Directors of Public Utilities and General Services recommend approval of the resolution; the County Manager concurs.

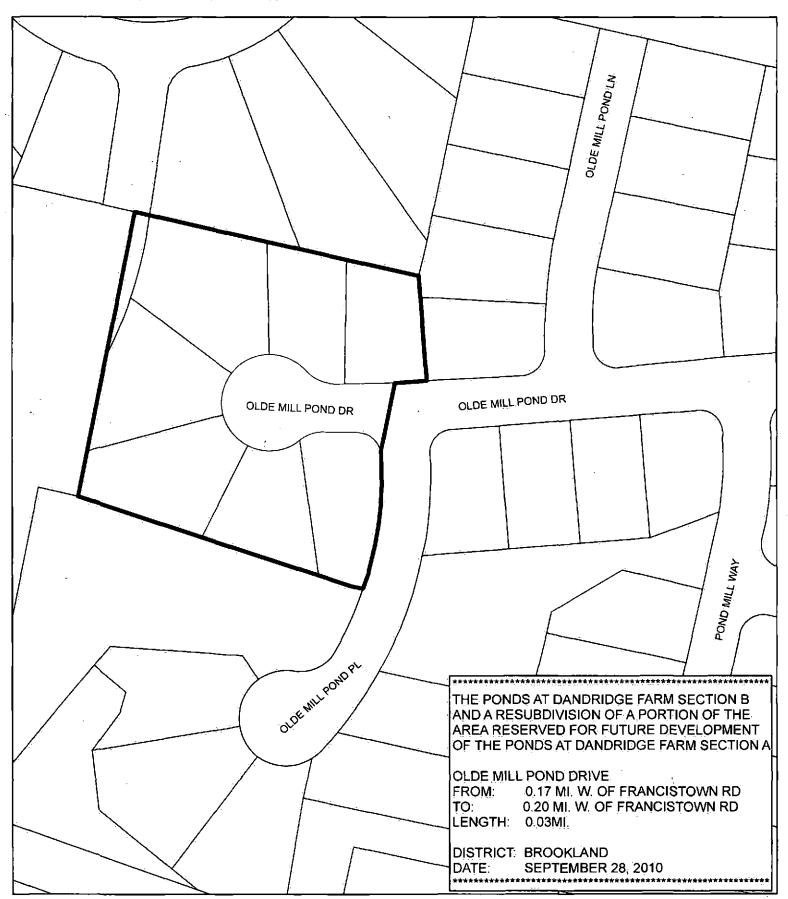
