PUBLIC HEARINGS - REZONING CASES AND PROVISIONAL USE PERMIT

46-11 C-2C-11 Varina Slurry Pavers, Inc.: Request to conditionally rezone from B-3 Business District, M-1 Light Industrial District, and M-2 General Industrial District to M-2C General Industrial District (Conditional), Parcels 805-722-3777 and 805-722-9069 containing 14.87 acres, located on the south line of Nine Mile Road (State Route 33) at its intersection with Echo Avenue. - 1. Except as amended hereby, all proffers accepted with Case C-66C-03 shall remain in full force and effect.
- 2. Amend Proffer 13 accepted with Case C-66C-03 to read as follows:

Fences – A vinyl privacy fence a minimum of six (6) feet in height shall be provided along the Property line adjacent to the railroad right of way and along the western Property line, but shall terminate at the point parallel with the location of the security gate. Fences on individual lots, except those located along the rear year which abuts the perimeter Property line, shall be restricted to a maximum height of seventy-two (72) inches, and must be constructed of white vinyl or finished masonry construction.

On motion of Mr. Glover, seconded by Mr. Donati, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

- 1. Architectural Treatment. The exposed portion of the exterior wall surface (front, rear and side) of such building constructed on the Property shall be predominantly of brick, fluted or split block, exterior rated decorative wood panels, or glass, except to the extent that other architectural materials are used for windows, doors, trim, signage, architectural decorations or design elements. If the wood panels fade, warp, or are otherwise damaged, they will be repaired or replaced. Other aesthetically comparable finished materials may be used if requested and specifically permitted by the Planning Commission at the time of Plan of Development review.
- 2. Architecture. The building's exterior design shall be substantially in conformance in the design and materials to the colored rendering marked as Exhibit A, a copy of which is found in the rezoning case file (see case file), or as specifically permitted by the Planning Commission at the time of Plan of Development review.
- And Landscaping. Parking lot setback areas, along the boundaries of the Property, shall be landscaped as required by the Planning Commission at the time of Landscape Plan review. Parking lots serving the Property shall be landscaped, including but not limited to the planting shrubbery and/or trees in raised islands located within such parking lots.
- 4. <u>Uses.</u> Principal uses permitted on the Property shall be limited to a medical office and clinic, or those principal uses permitted in a B-2 zoning district. The following uses shall not be permitted thereon:

- a. Automotive filling, repair and service stations including towing services;
- b. Recreational facilities, indoor, including theaters, bowling alleys, skating rinks (ice skating and roller skating), swimming pools, tennis, model race tracks, electronic video game rooms, bingo halls, archery ranges and similar activities including internet sweepstakes.
- c. Flea markets or antique auctions;
- d. Billboards;
- e. Recycling facilities;
- f. Funeral homes, mortuaries, crematories and/or undertaking establishments;
- g. Dance halls;
- h. Attention getting devices;
- i. Truck stops;
- j. Gun shop, sales and repair;
- k. Hotels, motels and motor lodges;
- 1. Parking garages or commercial parking lots;
- m. Sign painting shops;
- n. Communication towers;
- o. General hospitals, sanitariums and charitable institutions for human care;
- p. Adult business as defined in the Henrico County Zoning Ordinance;
- q. Bars, which, for the purposes of this restriction shall mean a business establishment whose primary business is the sale of alcoholic beverages in restaurants as licensed by the Virginia Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control;
- r. Establishments whose primary business is check cashing and/or the making of payday loans as defined and regulated by Sections 6.1-432 et seq. and 6.1-444 et seq. of the Code of Virginia (the foregoing shall not include banks, savings and loans, or similar financial institutions that are not regulated by the foregoing Virginia Code sections;
- s. Automobile, truck, or bus sales, rental and repair;
- t. Restaurants with drive thru windows;
- u. Massage parlors;
- v. Fortune teller, palmist, astrologist and numerologist;
- w. Radio and television broadcasting station or tower;
- x. Automobile, truck or RV storage lot;
- y. Private club, lodge, meeting hall or fraternal organization;
- z. Shooting range;
- aa. Billiard, bagatelle.
- 5. <u>Signage.</u> Signage shall be controlled by the standards for signage applicable to property in an O-2 zoning district.

- 6. <u>Hours.</u> Hours of operation will be limited to between 7:00 am to 10:00 pm, Monday through Sunday.
- 7. <u>Lighting.</u> Parking lot lighting shall be produced from concealed sources, be positioned in such a manner as to minimize the impact of such lighting on adjacent property and be reduced to no more than a security level following the close of business conducted on the Property.
- 8. Outdoor Storage. There shall be no outdoor storage.
- 9. <u>Site Access.</u> The site will be designed such that pedestrian and vehicular access will only be provided from Shrader Road. No access will be allowed from Fountain Avenue. The site will be developed generally as shown on Exhibit B (see case file), or as specifically permitted by the Planning Commission at the time of Plan of Development review.
- 10. <u>HVAC Screening.</u> Heating and air conditioning equipment and emergency generators shall be screened from public view at ground level at the property lines in a manner approved at the time of Plan of Development.
- 11. <u>Trash Receptacles.</u> Trash receptacles, not including convenience cans, shall be screened from public view at ground level and enclosed with material similar to the building approved at the time of Plan of Development.

31-11 C-26C-10 Brookland Sky 88 LLC: Request to conditionally rezone from O-2 Office District to B-1C Business District (Conditional), Parcel 769-741-6348 containing 0.47 acres, located on the east line of Morningside Drive approximately 160 feet south of its intersection with W. Broad Street (U. S. Route 250).

Jean Moore, Assistant Director of Planning for Comprehensive Planning and Administration, responded to a question from Mr. Glover.

- 1. <u>Uses</u>. The uses allowed on the property shall be limited to hair, beauty and/or nail salons plus those uses allowed in the O-1 District.
- 2. <u>Signage.</u> Detached signage shall be ground mounted monument-type signs and shall not exceed four (4) feet in height above grade.
- 3. Screening. To the extent reasonably practical, the clearing of mature trees and vegetation along the southern property line by the developer shall be limited. In addition, the Transitional Buffer 10 along the southern property line shall be widened to 15' with the Transitional Buffer 10 planting requirements remaining unchanged.
- 4. Site Lighting. Site lighting shall not exceed fifteen (15) feet in height as measured from the grade at the base of the lighting standard, unless otherwise requested, described and specifically approved, or if required by the Planning Commission, at the time of Plan of Development. Lighting shall be directed to minimize glare on public roads and adjacent properties, shall be produced from concealed sources and shall not exceed one-half (1/2) foot candle adjacent to the side property line where adjacent to residential property.
- 5. Architecture. Any future buildings on the property shall be residential in nature unless otherwise approved by the Planning Commission at the time of Plan of Development. In no case shall any corrugated metal or exposed, unfinished cinder block be exposed to view on any new building unless otherwise approved by the Planning Commission at the time of Plan of Development.
- 6. <u>Mechanical Equipment</u>. Mechanical equipment shall be screened from public view at ground level at the property lines as approved at the time of Plan of Development.
- 7. <u>Trash Pickup.</u> Trash pickup and parking lot cleaning shall be limited to times between 7:00 AM and 7:00 PM.
- 8. Outdoor Speakers. The use of outdoor speakers shall be prohibited.
- 9. <u>Trash Receptacles.</u> Trash receptacles not including convenience cans shall be screened from public view at ground level and enclosed with material similar to that of the existing building.
- 10. Parking Lot. The proposed parking lot shall be paved with curb and gutter. In addition, parking will be prohibited in the front yard.

Proposed Zoning Ordinance Amendments Pertaining to Refuse Container Collection Hours

Mr. Hazelett recognized Ben Blankinship, Principal Planner for Code Support, and noted that the Board previously asked staff to review this matter. Mr. Blankinship narrated a brief slide presentation titled Refuse Containers: Hours of Servicing. He pointed out that the current noise ordinance approved by the Board on February 23, 2010 prohibits noise from "loading or unloading of refuse, waste or recycling collection vehicles" that is "plainly audible in a residential area" between 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m. The problem is that enforcement requires residents to appear before a magistrate and request a summons whereas the zoning ordinance allows for enforcement by County staff.

After highlighting the problem with the noise ordinance, Mr. Blankinship defined refuse collection containers and reviewed current and proposed regulations in the County's zoning ordinance to restrict servicing of these containers. Mr. Blankinship and Mr. Hazelett responded to questions and concerns expressed by Mr. Kaechele and Mr. Glover regarding the adequacy of the distance requirements in the proposed regulations and the exclusion of containers serviced in Urban Mixed Use (UMU) districts from the proposed regulations. Mr. Hazelett advised that staff will address the Board's concerns before setting a public hearing date on the ordinance and will follow up with the Board by letter.

Virginia Department of Transportation Highway Safety Improvement Program

Mr. Hazelett recognized Mr. Foster, who in turn recognized the efforts of Transportation Development Engineer Todd Eure from his staff for his efforts in getting this program off the ground in Henrico County. Mr. Foster then narrated a slide presentation on the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP), which is a federal program structured and funded to reduce highway fatalities and injuries along corridors identified as having a high crash rate. It is administered in the Commonwealth by the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) and beginning in 2009 VDOT invited localities to submit engineering studies and project proposals for review and funding consideration. During his presentation, Mr. Foster reviewed the goals of the program; the amount of funding available through the program; the County's approach to the program; the five intersections within Henrico selected for HSIP funding in FY 2011, at a total cost of \$969,308; the schedule for the five projects selected for funding; and three intersections that are being submitted for funding consideration in FY 2012. During and following his presentation, Mr. Foster responded to questions from the Board pertaining to future funding and eligibility requirements for the program, characteristics of and accident trends and counts at intersections selected for funding, project schedules, and how the County will contract the work.

Proposed Specifications for the Henrico County Flag

Mr. Hazelett directed the Board's attention to two flags that were displayed on the conference room's bulletin board, one of which reflected the overall design of the existing County flag and the other of which depicted a new design standard being proposed by County staff. He noted that there was an item on the evening's regular meeting agenda to adopt a County flag. Mr. Hazelett recognized Mr. Proto, who made an oral presentation to the Board on this matter. Mr. Proto reported that staff discovered a couple of years ago after being contacted by a flag vendor in Glen Burnie, Maryland that there were no standard specifications for the County flag, which has been produced for years by a local vendor. Although the Board adopted a County seal in 1984 that was unofficially used in the County's flag design for many years, the colors in the seal were not specified and the Board did not adopt the flag. There is no state statute governing a local jurisdiction's adoption of a flag as there is for a seal but a previous Virginia Attorney General's opinion has advised that localities can adopt a flag. Mr. Proto once again directed the Board's attention to the two flags on display and explained the resolution on the evening's agenda to adopt the flag. He reviewed official specifications for the flag developed and proposed by staff and contained in the resolution proposed for adoption by the Board. Mr. Proto concluded his presentation by recommending that the flag's design standard be made available to any vendor

that is interested in producing the flag and that the County allow about a two-month grace period for replacement of all existing flags flying at County facilities.

Mr. Proto, Mr. Hazelett, Building and Grounds Manager Fred Drake, and Mrs. Acker responded to questions from the Board relating to the proposed flag specifications, including stripe and seal width and colors; future use of the seal by outside organizations and businesses; the impact of the new specifications on flag production costs; and the number of flags flying within the County. Mrs. O'Bannon expressed concern about the smaller seal size being proposed for the flag. Mr. Thornton concluded the discussions by stating that it was the Board's consensus to follow staff's recommendation to adopt the flag with the proposed official specifications.

The Board recessed for dinner at 6:01 p.m. and reconvened at 6:20 p.m.

There was additional discussion by the Board and staff regarding the previous matter. Mrs. O'Bannon reiterated her concern about the size of the seal. Mr. Proto noted that the Board could defer the resolution on the evening's agenda should it wish to do so to allow staff more time to revisit the specifications with the Board.

Mr. Hazelett briefly reviewed the zoning cases listed for public hearing on the evening's regular meeting agenda. Mr. Silber commented on the one other item on the evening's public hearing agenda, a resolution to change the street name of Wheat First Drive. In reviewing the items on the evening's general agenda, Mr. Hazelett noted that staff had sent the Board a letter explaining the general agenda resolution authorizing the County to execute and deliver the documents necessary for the Virginia Public School Authority (VPSA) to release refunding savings to the County. He and Mr. Pinkerton responded to questions from Mr. Kaechele regarding the status of the pending condemnation proceeding against the Trustees of Christ Episcopal Church. Mr. Hazelett also responded to a question from Mr. Donati regarding the County's schedule for updating its digital aerial photography.

Mr. Hazelett reviewed the concerns of two citizens who signed up in advance to speak during the evening's public comment period. The first citizen, John Gray who lives in the Varina District, feels that it is unfair he has to pay to play golf at Belmont Recreation Center whereas tennis players using the courts at the same facility are not charged a fee. The second citizen, Edward Powell who lives in the Fairfield District, is dissatisfied about the Division of Police's response to his report of a motor scooter being stolen from the shed on his property.

Mr. Hazelett responded to an inquiry by Mr. Kaechele pertaining to the status of the County's property negotiations with Shady Grove United Methodist Church. Mr. Hazelett and Mr. Proto suggested that the resolution to adopt the County flag be deferred for 60 days if the Board still had concerns. In response to questions from the Board, there was discussion by Mr. Hazelett and Mr. Vithoulkas of the County's FY 2011-12 budget process and the outlook for state and local revenues for the upcoming fiscal year. Mr. Glover commented on the percentage of the local education budget allocated to personnel and expressed concerns about the General Assembly's attempts to control spending by local school systems. Mr. Rapisarda commented and responded to questions from the Board on pending state legislation to repeal

sovereignt immunity for county governments, remove the presumption that local zoning decisions are valid, and strengthen landowner rights in condemnation cases. He and Mr. Hazelett cited a trend in the General Assembly towards legislation aimed at restricting the authority of local governments. Mr. Thornton suggested that the County develop visionary measures to help protect it against legislation to local governments. Mr. Hazelett and Mr. Rapisarda also responded to questions from Mr. Kachele relating to the state and local redistricting process and anticipated primary election schedule.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 6:48 p.m.

Mrs. O'Bannon called the meeting to order at 4:49 p.m. She welcomed everyone who was present and led them in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mrs. O'Bannon recognized Mr. Hazelett, who advised that the short agenda for this meeting would include the presentation of only one request to the General Assembly delegation followed by an update by Mr. Vithoulkas on the County's economic situation.

Dinner Briefing on 2011 County Legislative Program with General Assembly Delegation

Mr. Hazelett recognized Mr. Schnurman, who provided background information on the County's Legislative Program. Mr. Schnurman noted that the County is changing the way it does business in view of the difficult economic and fiscal climate. He reviewed the County's one legislative request, to grant the County local authority to establish defense manufacturing zones to provide certain tax and regulatory flexibility. The purpose of the zones would be to attract defense manufacturing businesses to the County. Mr. Schnurman explained that more than 14,400 jobs have been lost in the metropolitan region since 2008, with most of those losses occurring in Henrico due to the closing of Qimonda, LandAmerica, and Circuit City. He cited the County's central location between Washington, D.C. and Hampton Roads.

In response to a question from Senator McEachin, Mr. Hazelett commented on where the defense manufacturing zones could be located and their similarities and dissimilarities to enterprise zones. He also responded to questions from the Board pertaining to the size and zoning classifications of areas that would be included in the defense manufacturing zones and to a question from Senator Watkins concerning whether the proposed legislation will be specific to Henrico County. Delegate Massie remarked that the County should make it clear up front that the proposed zones would be revenue neutral to the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Mr. Trice distributed copies of a slide presentation titled *Corporate Tax Initiatives Undertaken* by *Henrico County: A Closer Look.* Mr. Schnurman recognized Mr. Vithoulkas, who advised that staff would not be providing a narrative presentation of this information. Mr. Vithoulkas

introduced Mr. Trice and Mr. Walter.

Mr. Vithoulkas narrated a slide presentation offering a financial overview of the County. The first portion of his presentation included a look at what national and local indicators are telling us and also addressed state funding and what it means to Henrico County. Delegate Massie challenged Mr. Vithoulkas' assertion that the State's revenue projections for FY 2010-11 are currently not being met and Delegate Janis challenged Mr. Vithoulkas' premise that percentage reductions requested of State agencies in the Governor's budget "savings" plans will equate to similar reductions in State aid to the County.

Mr. Hazelett suggested a brief recess while dinner was being served. Mr. Drumwright delivered the invocation and Chef Winslow Goodier, the Culinary Arts Instructor for Hermitage Technical Center, explained the dinner menu.

The Board recessed at 5:30 p.m. and reconvened at 5:41 p.m.

Mr. Vithoulkas resumed his slide presentation by reviewing Henrico's basic financial premises and tax environment, including keys to the County's financial success; how the County is taking advantage of its current opportunity to change operations; and additional cost reductions that will be necessary in FY 2011-12. He and Mr. Hazelett responded to questions and comments from Delegate Morrissey and Delegate O'Bannon relating to federal stimulus funds received by the County under the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act of 2009.

Delegate Massie commented on discussions in the House of Delegates to reduce rates for the Business, Professional, Occupational, and License (BPOL) tax and machinery and tools tax and to offset these revenues by expanding the sales tax to include professional services. He and Delegate Ingram responded to questions from Mr. Glover and Delegate Morrissey regarding the impetus and rationale for this proposal. Mr. Hazelett explained Henrico's exemption from the BPOL tax for certain small businesses based on the amount of their annual gross receipts and how the threshold for exemption differs in Chesterfield. Senator McEachin questioned whether the proposal would in fact be revenue neutral for localities. There was discussion by Delegate Massie and Mr. Glover concerning the relative fairness of a sales tax on services versus the existing BPOL tax on business gross receipts.

Mr. Vithoulkas responded to a question from Delegate O'Bannon pertaining to the County's citizen/position ratio. He and Mr. Hazelett also responded to questions from Delegate Morrissey relating to the County's personnel reductions in the areas of general government and schools and whether the County has considered replacing its fleet with electric cars, and to a question from Delegate Janis regarding the cost of using biodiesel fuel vehicles. At Mr. Kaechele's request, Mr. Vithoulkas and Mr. Hazelett commented on the County's electricity generation project at its landfill.

Mrs. O'Bannon, Chair of the County's 2011 Commemoration Advisory Commission, noted that Henrico will be celebrating its 400th anniversary in 2011. After pointing out that Mrs. Harper is leading the Commission's planning efforts, Mr. Vithoulkas referred to the ways the Commemoration is being promoted, including the development of a Henrico business discount card, and briefly summarized his presentation.

Delegate O'Bannon thanked County staff for the presentation, noted the delegation's responsibility for balancing a state budget that in future years will not include federal stimulus funds as a revenue source, pointed out that the General Assembly is still working on the BPOL tax and machinery and tools tax rate reduction proposal, and emphasized the importance of the delegation and the County working together. He referred to the large number of recent employee layoffs within England's national health corps.

Mr. Hazelett and Mr. Vithoulkas responded to questions from Delegate Morrissey and Senator McEachin pertaining to the impact of the Henrico address initiative on local revenues and to questions and comments from Senator Watkins and Delegate Massie relating to the local revenue impact of a sales tax on services. Mr. Glover expressed concerns regarding how this proposed tax would affect the Commonwealth's business climate and economic competitiveness with other states. There was further discussion by Delegate Massie, Mr. Glover, Senator McEachin, and Mr. Vithoulkas pertaining to the implications of this proposed tax. Mr. Kaechele suggested consideration could perhaps be given to broadening the sales tax to include meals rather than services. Delegate Morrissey congratulated the Henrico Board and staff on its financial stewardship and stated that he would oppose lowering the rates on either the BPOL or machinery and tools tax.

Mr. Hazelett once again recognized Chef Goodier, who announced that Hermitage Technical Center's culinary arts program recently received accreditation from the American Culinary Institute, the third program in the Commonwealth and 116th in the nation to attain this monumental achievement. Chef Goodier had the following students who were present from the Hermitage Technical Center culinary arts program introduce themselves and identify their home schools: Michelle Ampah (Hermitage), Talia Brown (Varina), Jaquise Cofield (Hermitage), Gabrielle Elms (Tucker), Chris Finn (Varina), Megann Garber (Godwin), Josh Lambert (Henrico), Mildres Cano Moralez (Hermitage), Thomas Wood (Godwin), and Joseph Woodford (Henrico). He pointed out that this marks the 11th year that his program has prepared and served the meal at the Board's annual dinner meeting with the Henrico delegation.

Mrs. O'Bannon noted that one of the County's new business discount cards, known as the Henrico Advantage Card, had been placed at the seat of each member of the delegation. She explained that the cards can be registered online and that BB&T was sponsoring the program, which will encourage persons to shop in Henrico.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 6:42 p.m.

All design issues raised during the review of the project have been resolved.

- 1. The Director of Public Utilities shall approve the construction plans for public water and sewer prior to beginning any construction of these utilities. The Department of Public Utilities shall be notified at least 24 hours prior to the start of any County water or sewer construction.
- 2. The parking lot shall be subject to the requirements of Section 24-98 of the Henrico County Code.
- 3. The parking spaces shall be marked on the pavement surface with four-inch wide white painted traffic lines. All lane lines and parking lines shall be white in color with the exception that those dividing traffic shall be yellow.
- 4. Sufficient, effective usable parking shall be provided. If experience indicates the need, additional parking shall be provided.
- 5. Curb and gutter and necessary storm sewer shall be constructed as shown on approved plans.

- 15. The assigned property number shall be displayed so it is easily readable from the street. If assistance is needed with the address, please contact the Department of Planning at 501-4284. The Planning Department must assign all property addresses.

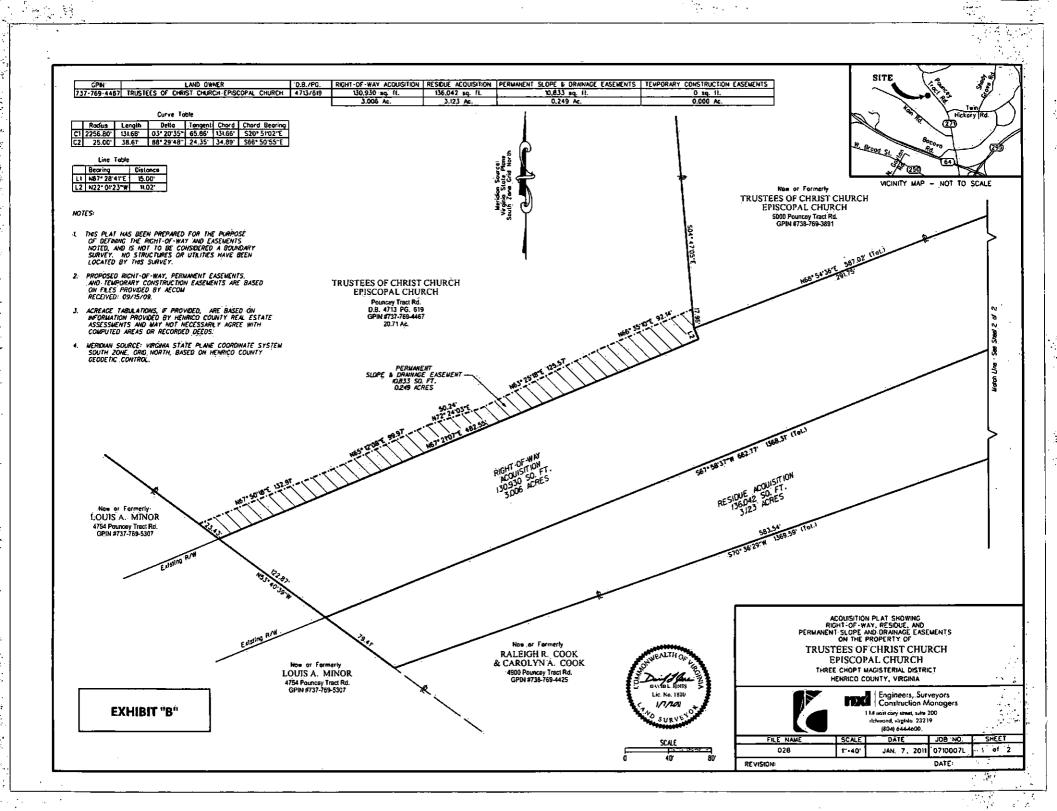
WHEREAS, the Owner has agreed to convey the Right-of-Way and Easements and the Residue Property to the County for the total sum of \$787,918; and,

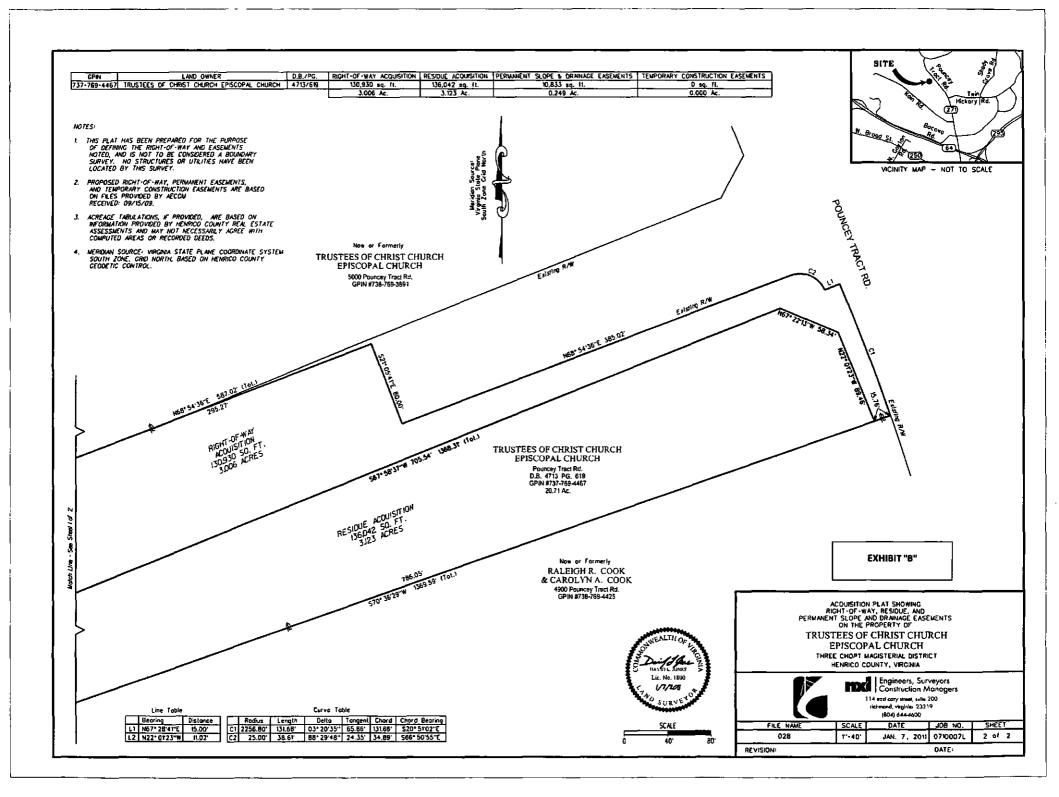
WHEREAS, County staff has prepared the necessary documents to memorialize the agreements of the parties and to complete the acquisition.

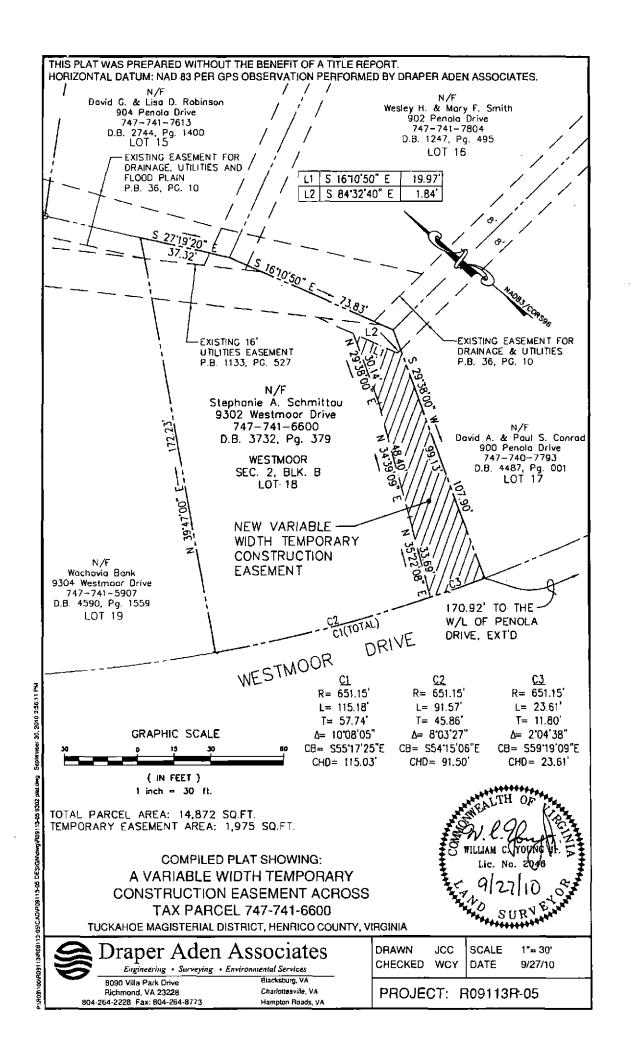
