132-11 C-5C-11 Varina Ronald Taylor: Request to conditionally rezone from A-1 Agricultural District to B-3C Business District (Conditional) Parcel 808-722-7565 containing approximately 1.26 acres, located on the north line of Nine Mile Road (State Route 33) approximately 250' west of its intersection with E. MANAGER'S COMMENTS

The Henrico County Public Library (HCPL) has been selected as the 2011 recipient of two Virginia Public Library Directors Association (VPLDA) annual awards for its distinguished contributions to the promotion of improved public understanding of library and information services. This year, HCPL was recognized for its development of the Notable Henricoans database, created as a special project for Henrico County's 400th anniversary commemoration, and was also recognized for outstanding service innovation in its workshops for childcare providers. The awards were presented in April at VPLDA's annual meeting. Jerry McKenna, Director of Libraries, and the following members of his staff were congratulated by the County Manager for these outstanding achievements: Christine Campbell, Assistant Director of Libraries; Pat Muller, Youth Services Coordinator; and Barbara Weedman, Public Services Administrator.

The Department of General Services' Central Automotive Division and the Department of Public Works' Traffic Engineering Division have been accepted into the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality's (DEQ's) Virginia Environmental Excellence Program (VEEP) at These two operations spent a considerable amount of time and put forth outstanding effort in developing an Environmental Management System (EMS), which allows them to identify their environmental impacts, establish priorities, set improvement goals, and monitor their successes. They are the first two operations in the County to have a fully implemented EMS, and they have laid the foundation for future operations to follow. The County Manager recognized the following employees for their perseverance and dedication towards environmental excellence: from the General Services Central Automotive Maintenance EMS Team, Charlie Gibbens, Fleet Manager; Alan Eddleton, Superintendent of Maintenance; Mike Arrighi, Auto Equipment Supervisor; and Jason Young, Environmental Coordinator; and from the Public Works Traffic Engineering Division EMS Team, John Cejka, Assistant Traffic Engineer; Chris Johnson, Traffic Engineering Technician; John Fowler, Environmental Engineer; and Mr. Young, who served on both teams. He also recognized Steve Yob, Solid Waste Division Director for the Department of Public Utilities, for leading that division in becoming the County's first division to be accepted into VEEP at the E2 level. Michael P. Murphy, DEO's Piedmont Office Regional Director, offered additional background information on the VEEP program, highlighted the environmental accomplishments of the Traffic Engineering and Central Automotive Divisions, and congratulated the County for a job He then presented plaques to the three divisions of the County selected for membership in the program and flags to the two divisions that achieved the E3 level.

The Henrico County Board of Supervisors convened a special meeting on Tuesday, May 24, 2011 at 4:30 p.m. in the County Manager's Conference Room, Administration Building, Henrico County Government Center, Parham and Hungary Spring Roads, Henrico, Virginia.

Mr. Thornton called the meeting to order at 4:36 p.m.

Mr. Hazelett noted that the order of the agenda was being changed due to a scheduling issue.

Historic Document on Loan to the County

Mr. Hazelett recognized Sam McKelvey, Site Manager for the Dabbs House Museum and Henrico County Tourist Information Center, who shared an historic hand-written letter that will be on loan to the County for a five-year period from Dr. Paul White, a California resident. The letter, which is valued at \$40,000, was signed by Gen. Robert E. Lee and addressed to G. W. Randolph while General Lee was staying at Dabbs House. The original will be displayed in ultraviolet protected glass at Dabbs House, and reproductions will be marketed by the Division of Recreation and Parks. Mr. McKelvey responded to questions from Mr. Donati and Mrs. O'Bannon.

Proposed Ordinance Amendments Pertaining to the Public Street Frontage Requirements for Family Divisions

Mr. Hazelett recognized Ben Blankinship, Principal Planner, who narrated a slide presentation titled Proposed Amendment to Allow Family Subdivisions with No Public Street Frontage. During his presentation, Mr. Blankinship reviewed the County's current street frontage requirement; public policy concerns relating to private drives in subdivisions; requests received by the County to provide an exception for family divisions from the current public street frontage requirements; previous meetings where this matter was initially discussed by the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors; the two issues the Board asked the Planning Commission to address when remanding a draft ordinance to the Planning Commission in September 2010; recent meetings of the Planning Commission where these issues were discussed; the current exemption for family divisions from the County's subdivision process; and regulations and requirements that would be included under a proposed subdivision amendment. Mr. Hazelett, Planning Director Joe Emerson, Public Works Director Tim Foster, Mr. Pinkerton, and Fire Chief Ed Smith assisted Mr. Blankinship in responding to numerous questions from the Board during Mr. Blankinship's presentation. Mr. Glover expressed concerns regarding the amount of acreage that would have to be set aside for private drives under the proposed subdivision amendment. Mr. Hazelett elaborated on the public safety concerns associated with private drives. There was considerable discussion pertaining to the private drive construction and paving standards recommended by staff to the Planning Commission compared to those recommended by the Planning Commission.

At Mr. Hazelett's request, Mr. Blankinship shared slides depicting areas within the County where there are issues with family divisions. Mr. Hazelett commented that the depicted areas show what can happen over time if the County does not establish requirements. There was further discussion by Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Blankinship, and Mr. Hazelett concerning the construction of private roads within family divisions. Mr. Thornton commented that the Board should consider how it wants Henrico to look in the future and should also be cognizant of protecting future generations of families. Mr. Donati remarked that there should be some flexibility in the private road subdivision requirements. In response to a question from Mr. Kaechele, Mr. Blankenship shared a slide depicting private drive construction standards established by several other Virginia counties and the Virginia Department of Transportation. After Mr. Blankinship reviewed this information with the Board, Mr. Donati suggested that the Board accept staff's recommendation for private drive construction standards with the exception of the proposed requirement for a 24-foot-wide surface. He offered an 18-foot-wide surface requirement as an alternative, which was supported by the other members of the Board. The consensus of the Board was also to accept the staff recommendation rather than the Planning Commission recommendation regarding address and directional sign posting requirements for homes on private roads. Mr. Hazelett noted that the next step will be to hold a public hearing by the Board on the proposed subdivision amendment.

Proposed Ordinance Amendments Pertaining to Refuse Collection Container Hours

Mr. Hazelett again recognized Ben Blankinship, who narrated a slide presentation titled *Refuse Containers: Hours of Servicing*. During his presentation, Mr. Blankinship explained the enforcement problem under the current noise ordinance related to the loading or unloading of refuse, waste, or recycling collection vehicles that is plainly audible in a residential area; the

definition of refuse collection containers; current zoning regulations on the servicing of refuse containers in business districts; changes to these regulations that were previously recommended by the Planning Commission; concerns expressed by the Board during a January work session on this matter; and new regulations proposed by staff. The proposed regulations would prohibit the servicing of refuse containers between 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m., remove an existing 250-foot distance requirement, and include Urban Mixed Use Districts (UMUs) among those districts where the servicing of refuse containers is regulated. Following his presentation, Mr. Blankinship responded to questions and comments from the Board. He noted that staff's intention is to enforce the ordinance on a complaint basis only. The consensus of the Board was to move forward with staff's recommendations.

The Board recessed for dinner at 5:56 p.m. and reconvened at 6:07 p.m.

Permanent Dog Tags

Mr. Hazelett recognized Tim Leclerc, Acting Treasury Division Director, who narrated a slide presentation on a Proposed Ordinance to Amend and Reordain Dog License Sections. During his presentation, Mr. Leclerc reviewed the sections of the County Code affected by the proposed changes; a summary of the proposed changes; dog license requirements under the current Code; advantages of the proposed changes; a revenue estimate of the proposed changes; current dog license statistics; trends in annual dog license renewals; and existing dog license requirements in other localities within the Richmond metropolitan area and in selected localities outside the area. He concluded his presentation by noting that the proposed ordinance would improve convenience and customer service; replace the annual tag with a permanent tag; replace annual license renewals with a multi-year renewal option concurrent with the valid rabies certificate; maintain the validity of the single year license; maintain the same kennel licensing options; and ensure that the renewal workload no longer coincides with the tax deadline. During and following his presentation, Mr. Leclerc and Animal Protection Supervisor Shawn Sears responded to questions from the Board. Mr. Hazelett clarified that the only locality in the Commonwealth of Virginia that licenses cats is the City of Richmond. Hearing no objections from the Board, Mr. Hazelett advised that staff will proceed in preparing the proposed ordinance for public hearing.

Mr. Hazelett updated the Board on the evening's regular meeting agenda items. He responded to questions from the Board regarding a resolution to award a contract for architectural and engineering services for the new Health Department Clinic at 1400 North Laburnum Avenue. Mr. Thornton suggested keeping the playground area behind the County-owned Glen Echo property after modular units for the Health Department are constructed on that site.

Mr. Hazelett advised the Board of two citizens who had previously signed up to speak during the evening's public comment period. One of the scheduled speakers, Dr. Michael E. Murphy, had indicated to staff that he would be expressing concerns about the Springfield Road extension project. There was discussion by Mr. Hazelett, Mr. Pinkerton, Mr. Glover, and Mr. Kaechele relating to the history and status of this project and the concerns of Dr. Murphy and other citizens who live in neighborhoods that are in close proximity to the corridor where a section of the road will be relocated.

Mr. Donati noted that the City of Virginia Beach is using abandoned parking meters to collect money for the homeless. There was discussion by the Board, Mr. Hazelett, and Maj. Steve Alloway from the Division of Police regarding the solicitation practices of the County's homeless residents. Mr. Drumwright pointed out that Homeward, the planning and coordinating organization for homeless services in the Richmond region, has previously commended Henrico for taking the lead in adopting an ordinance that prohibits solicitation in the intersections of County roads.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 6:39 p.m.

- 1. The Director of Public Utilities shall approve the construction plans for public water and sewer prior to beginning any construction of these utilities. The Department of Public Utilities shall be notified at least 24 hours prior to the start of any County water or sewer construction.
- 2. The parking lot shall be subject to the requirements of Section 24-98 of the Henrico County Code.
- 3. The parking spaces shall be marked on the pavement surface with four-inch wide white painted traffic lines. All lane lines and parking lines shall be white in color with the exception that those dividing traffic shall be yellow.
- 4. Sufficient, effective usable parking shall be provided. If experience indicates the need, additional parking shall be provided.
- 5. Curb and gutter and necessary storm sewer shall be constructed as shown on approved plans.
- 6. The plan of development shall be revised as annotated on the staff plan dated **June 14, 2011**, which shall be as much a part of this approval as if its details were fully described herein. Eight (8) sets of revised plans, including the detailed drainage, erosion control and utility plans shall be submitted by the design engineer who prepared the plans to the Department of Planning for final review. Upon notice from the Department of Planning that all comments have been addressed, twenty-one (21) sets of final plans for signature shall be submitted to the Department of Planning for approval signatures.
- 7. The Department of Public Works shall be notified at least 24 hours prior to the start of any construction.
- 8. Two copies of an Erosion and Sediment Control Agreement shall be submitted to the Department of Public Works. Approval is required prior to construction plan approval and beginning construction.
- 9. A detailed landscaping plan shall be submitted to the Department of Planning for review and approval prior to the issuance of any occupancy permits.
- 10. All ground cover and landscaping shall be properly maintained in a healthy condition at all times. Dead plant materials shall be removed within a reasonable time and replaced during the normal planting season.
- 11. Prior to the approval of an electrical permit application and installation of the site lighting equipment, a plan including light spread and intensity diagrams and fixture specifications and mounting height details shall be submitted for Department of Planning review and approval.
- 12. All exterior lighting shall be designed and arranged to direct the light and glare away from nearby residential property and streets.
- 13. The site, including the parking areas, shall be kept clean of litter and debris on a daily basis. Trash container units/litter receptacles and recycling containers shall be maintained with scheduled regular pickups and shall be screened properly on all four sides. The gate(s) shall remain closed except when the receptacle(s) are being filled or serviced and shall be repaired or replaced as necessary. Details shall be included with the final site plan or required landscape plan review and approval.
- 14. Required fire lanes shall be marked and maintained in accordance with the Virginia Statewide Fire Prevention Code.


- 15. Traffic control signs shall be provided as indicated on the Planning staff plan. All signs shall be fabricated as shown in <u>The National Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways</u> and <u>The Virginia Supplement to The Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways</u>.
- 16. The assigned property number shall be displayed so it is easily readable from the street. If assistance is needed with the address, please contact the Department of Planning at 501-4284. The Planning Department must assign all property addresses.
- 17. The contractor shall have a set of plans approved by the Director of Public Works, Director of Public Utilities and the County Manager available at the site at all times when work is being performed. A designated responsible employee shall be available for contact by County inspectors.

Upon completion of the improvements and prior to the certification of the permanent occupancy permit, the engineer or land surveyor who prepared the POD plan shall furnish a statement to the effect that all construction, including water and sewer is in conformance with the regulations and requirements of the POD.
- 20. The developer shall provide fire hydrants as required by the Department of Public Utilities and Division of Fire.
- 21. Insurance Service Offices (ISO) calculations should be included on the final construction plans for approval by the Department of Public Utilities prior to issuance of a building permit.
- 22. Any necessary offsite drainage easements must be obtained in a form acceptable to the County Attorney prior to final approval of the construction plans by the Department of Public Works.
- 23. Deviations from County standards for pavement, curb, or curb and gutter design shall be approved by the County Engineer prior to final approval of the construction plans by the Department of Public Works.
- 24. Vehicles shall be parked only in approved and constructed parking spaces.
- 25. The construction shall be properly coordinated to ensure that safe access, circulation and adequate parking is provided for the facility. A plan to indicate the phasing of improvements and the handling of traffic (construction and employees) shall be submitted to the Department of Planning prior to the issuance of a building permit.
- 26. The easements for drainage and utilities as shown on approved plans shall be granted to the County in a form acceptable to the County Attorney prior to any occupancy permits being issued. The easement plats and any other required information shall be submitted to the County Real Property Agent at least sixty (60) days prior to requesting occupancy permits.



This Board paper introduces for advertisement and public hearing on July 12, 2011 an ordinance to amend several Henrico Code sections relating to dog licenses. Currently, the Finance Department issues a new license for each dog every year. These amendments change the dog license period to run concurrently with a dog's rabies vaccination effective period. In addition, these amendments allow the Finance Department to issue a permanent metal dog license tag, instead of issuing a new tag with each license renewal.

This matter was discussed with the Board of Supervisors in a work session on May 24, 2011.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF HENRICO COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

1. That Section 5-49(a) of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 5-49. Required; tax year; amount of tax; exemptions from tax.

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person residing in the county, other than a releasing agency that has registered as such with the division of police, animal protection unit, to own a dog four months of age or older unless such dog is licensed as required by this division. Dog licenses shall be for the calendar year, from January 1 to December 31. The licensing period for an individual dog license issued after July 13, 2011 shall be equal to and run concurrently with the rabies vaccination effective period for that dog. The licensing period for a kennel shall be for the calendar year, from January 1 to December 31. A dog license issued under this division is nonrefundable, nontransferable, and will not be prorated. The license tax is in addition to any fee due under this chapter for a dangerous dog registration certificate. The license tax shall be payable to the office of the director of finance or at such substation as shall be designated by the director of finance, and shall be in the following amounts:

- (1) For each dog, \$10.00 for one year or less, or \$15.00 for more than one year.
- (2) For each duplicate tag, \$1.00.
- (3) For each kennel for up to 50 dogs, \$50.00.
- 2. That Section 5-50 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 5-50. Due date for payment of tax.

- (a) On or before January 1 but not later than January 31 of each year, the owner of any dog four months of age or older shall pay a license tax as prescribed in section 5-49. The license tax for an individual dog is due not later than 30 days after a dog has reached the age of four months, or not later than 30 days after an owner acquires a dog four months of age or older. Subsequently, the license tax for an individual dog is due within 30 days of the expiration date on the license receipt.
- (b)—If a dog becomes four months of age or comes into the possession of any person residing in the county after January 1 of any year, the license tax for the current calendar year shall be due and payable by the owner not later than 30 days after the dog or cat has reached the age of four months. The license tax for a kennel shall be due on January 1 and not later than January 31 of each year.
- 3. That Section 5-51(a) of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 5-51. Failure to pay tax.

- (a) Any person convicted of failure to pay the dog license tax prior to February 1 of any year, or as otherwise provided in this division, on any dog owned by him shall be guilty of a class 4 misdemeanor. Such person shall be required to obtain the proper license forthwith. Unless the fine and license tax are paid immediately, the court shall order the proper disposition of such dog by the animal protection supervisor or some other officer, but the disposition of such dog shall not relieve its owner of the payment of the fine and the license tax already due.
- 4. That Section 5-53(a) of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 5-53. Application for license; issuance.

- (a) Any person may obtain a dog license required by this division by making application to the director of finance of the county accompanied by the amount of license tax and certificate of vaccination as required in Code of Virginia. § 3.2-6521. The director of finance shall only have authority to license dogs of resident owners or custodians who reside within the boundary limits of the county, and may require information to this effect from any applicant. Upon receipt of proper application and the certificate of vaccination, the director of finance shall issue a license receipt for the amount of the license tax. The receipt shall state the name and address of the owner or custodian of the dog, the date of payment, the year for which issued expiration date, the serial number of the tag, and whether the license is for a male, unsexed female, female or kennel. The metal license tags or plates provided for in section 5-54 for kennels shall be delivered with the receipt to the owner. The metal license tag issued for an individual dog after July 13, 2011 is a permanent tag. Once a permanent tag has been issued to an individual dog, additional metal license tags for that dog will be issued only pursuant to § 5-55. The information thus received shall be retained by the director of finance open to public inspection during the period for which such license is valid.
- 5. That Section 5-54 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 5-54. License tags generally.

A dog license shall consist of a license receipt and a metal tag, as authorized pursuant to Code of Virginia, § 3.2-6526. The tag shall be stamped or otherwise permanently marked to show the county issuing the license, the ealendar year for which issued and a serial number. The license tag for a kennel shall show the number of dogs authorized to be kept under such license and have attached thereto a metal identification plate for each of such dogs, numbered to correspond with the serial number of the license tag.

6. That Section 5-57 of the Code of the County of Henrico be amended and reordained as follows:

Sec. 5-57. Dogs not wearing tag presumed unlicensed.

Any dog not wearing a collar bearing a license tag of the proper calendar year shall, prima facie, be deemed to be unlicensed. In any proceedings under the provisions of this chapter, the burden of proof of the fact that such dog has been licensed or is otherwise not required to bear a tag at the time shall be on the owner of the dog.

7. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately.

RESOLUTION - Signatory Authority - Henrico Juvenile Detention Home Medical Services Contract.

This Board paper authorizes the County Manager to sign a contract between the Department of Pediatrics, Virginia Commonwealth University Health System and the County on behalf of the Juvenile Detention Home. Through this agreement, the Department of Pediatrics will provide a licensed physician for medical services at the Detention Home. The physician will make regular scheduled visits as established by the Superintendent.

This contract will begin on July 1, 2011 and terminate on June 30, 2012. The total amount of contract is \$13,320.00 plus \$100.00 per hour for unscheduled visits to the Detention Home. Funds are available in the 2012 budget.

This Board paper is recommended by the Superintendent of the Juvenile Detention Home. The County Manager concurs.

CONTRACT AGREEMENT

BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF HENRICO ON BEHALF OF THE JUVENILE DETENTION HOME AND THE DEPARTMENT OF PEDIATRICS VIRGINIA COMMONWEALTH UNIVERSITY HEALTH SYSTEM

Section I. Parties

The parties to this agreement are the County of Henrico on behalf of the Henrico Juvenile Detention home, hereinafter referred to as the "Detention Home," and the Department of Pediatrics, Virginia Commonwealth University/Health System, hereinafter referred to as "Department," which will provide the physician/medical consultant, hereinafter referred to as the "physician."

Section II. Purpose

The purpose of this agreement is to set out the responsibilities of each party and, thereby, enable coordination and cooperation in the provision of medical services to mutual clients. This agreement will assure that appropriate medical services are available to Detention Home residents and that consultation services are available to the nurse and/or administration of the Detention Home.

Section III. Responsibilities

- A. The Department agrees to provide a licensed physician who will:
 - 1. Visit the Detention Home once each week, at a time mutually agreeable to the parties, to review the

nurse's screening and evaluation of each youth and to examine all those youth deemed necessary by the nurse, as the Detention Home assumes full responsibility for this referral.

- 2. Help develop and approve all written medical policies within the Detention Home and assist in maintaining compliance with State Medical and Pharmaceutical Board Standards as well as Core, Secure Detention, and Post Disposition Standards.
- 3. Be on call for consultation and instructions on a twenty-four hour per day, seven days per week basis to the nurse and/or Detention Home Administration concerning any medical problem of a detainee.
- A. Be available to visit and shall visit the Detention Home at other than the scheduled time if called by the Superintendent or an Assistant Superintendent when an acute medical condition occurs. Compensation for such visits shall be at the rate set out in Section III, C, 10.
- 5. Coordinate and facilitate medical care at VCU
 Health System when needed, including in the Child
 and Adolescent Emergency Unit, Adolescent Health
 Service or VCU Hospital Unit.
- 6. Aid the nurse and/or administration of the Detention Home in determining which cases can wait for

medical evaluation at the appropriate medical facility and which cases constitute a more serious emergency situation needing urgent care at Henrico Doctors' Hospital Parham Campus who has agreed to accept extreme emergency cases (extreme meaning life or death cases or those situations that cannot wait).

- Provide recommendations to the appropriate Court or other appropriate authorities, through the nurse or Detention Home Administrator, that a youth be transferred to a mental health agency or medical clinic or hospital, if after consultation, the physician determines that youth requires specialized care that is available at the Detention Home.
- 8. Provide special direction for the nurse and child care staff at the Detention Home for a youth requiring close medical supervision.
- 9. Coordinate the exchange of medical information between the Detention facility and private physicians or other regular sources of health care.

B. Miscellaneous

 The Department agrees to provide physicians who shall abide by all present or future State laws and regulations relative to the practice of

medical services within the Commonwealth of Virginia.

- 2. Each physician shall assume responsibility for providing his/her own malpractice insurance, payment of taxes, and any other license fee or expenses incurred not heretofore delineated.
- 3. It is the responsibility of the Department to see that all provisions of this contract pertaining to the Department and Department physicians are met and complied with.
- 4. The Services covered by this agreement shall not be subcontracted or assumed without the prior written consent of the parties.
- C. The Detention Home agrees, within the limitations of available funding (where applicable), to:
 - 1. Not restrict any Department physician in the practice of medicine when performed in accordance to the law of the State of Virginia.
 - 2. Provide the services of a nurse on a 40 hour a week basis, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.
 - 3. Provide a private place with modern equipment suitable for medical staff to examine youth in the Detention Home at no cost to the Department or the physician.

- 4. Provide medical supplies as deemed necessary by the physician at no cost to the physician or the Department.
- 5. Arrange appropriate transportation through the Henrico County's Sheriff's Department, Division of Police, or volunteer rescue squad ambulance, if needed, to transfer clients to VCU Health System or other medical facility for treatment.
- 6. Administer medication and treatments prescribed or approved by the physician and follow his orders concerning medical care to youth in the Detention Home.
- 7. Arrange for the payment for all medical care rendered at VCU Health System on a fee-for-service basis for youth confined at the Detention Home.
- 8. Arrange for the obtaining of parental or guardian consent when necessary for medical care.
- Designate staff who are authorized to request services from the Department.
- 10. Compensate the Department at the rate of \$100.00 per hour for unscheduled visits to the Detention Home additional to that specified in Section III, A, 1, above.

Section IV. Purchase of Services

- The Detention Home agrees to pay the Department \$13,320 per year in twelve equal installments or \$1,110 payable the first week of each month for the month preceding without monthly notice from the Department.
- 2. Additional fees, if any, as may be incurred pursuant to Section III, C, 10 shall be rendered the first week of the month following the month during which the additional fees were incurred.

Section V. Availability of Services

- 1. All parties to this agreement will provide services to all eligible clients without regard to race, color, sex, religion, national origin or handicap.
- 2. It is understood and agreed that there shall be no medical or pharmaceutical testing for experimental or research purposes.

Section VI. Terms of Agreement

1. The agreement shall become effective July 1, 2011 and shall remain in effect for one full year. At least 90 days prior to the expiration of the agreement, a joint evaluation of the terms of the

- In the event that either party desires to amend or terminate this agreement prior to its expiration,

This resolution awards a contract to Piedmont Construction Co, Inc. to rehabilitate approximately 3.3 miles of 8-inch, 12-inch, and 15-inch diameter sewer piping, approximately 115 standard manholes, and approximately 310 sewer service laterals. The project also includes the replacement of approximately 0.6 miles of 3-inch, 6-inch and 8-inch diameter water mains with 6-inch, 8-inch, and 12-inch diameter water mains and approximately 75 water services. 

On February 24, 2004, the Board awarded a contract to Austin Brockenbrough & Associates, LLP for a total lump sum fee of \$928,259.00 for the preparation of design and construction plans for Sadler Road from Dominion Boulevard to 150 feet east of Cedar Branch Court (approximately 1.90 miles).

Additional work is required to separate the entire project into two phases, to update the Phase I design plans from Dominion Boulevard to Sadler Grove Road to current design criteria, and to finalize the Phase I plans for public hearing and advertisement. Austin Brockenbrough & Associates, LLP and the Department of Public Works have negotiated a fixed lump sum fee of \$398,772.00 for the additional design work.
